Thus, after three days of the strictest scrutiny by means of intelligence, candor and science, were the persons in whose presence these sounds are heard, acquitted

On Friday evening, after the lecture, three of the committee, viz : Hon. A. P. Hascall, D. B. McCallum and Wun. Fisher, repaired to the nouse of a citizen and pursued their investigations still farther. There were nearly a score of persons present. The members of the committee wrote many questions on paper, which no person present knew the purport of, and they were answered correctly. At times they would ask mentally, and would receive the answers with equal correctness, and they were fully satisfied that there was something present mainfesting intelli-

One of the committee tried the experiment of standing the ladies on glass and failed to get any sounds; but the same was subsequently tried in presence of a larger num ber of persons, and the sounds were as loud and distinct
