The Governor and Council have refused to pass the revenue bill in consequence of instructions having been received from the home government not to pass any bill, unless for one year certain, consequently the different ports of Jamaica were quite free to the admission of all goods without duty.

Great excitement had been caused throughout the Island by the rejection on the part of the Council of the retrenchment bill, and rumours had been affoat of the intention of the governor to dissolve the but lately elected Assembly in consequence of the majority of its members being determined to curtail the immense amount under which the Island has been so long laboring in the payment of the salaries of their officials.

The harbour of Kingston was quite deserted when the Steamer left, and but for the arrival of the passengers by her at that place, who caused some slight reaction in trade, by the very liberal manner in which they parted with their gold, there would have been quite a depression of business.
