

succeeded in doing after several of his bones were broken, and he was otherwise mutilated in a most shocking manner.

But the most lamentable part of our story remains to be told. While Knox was being conveyed home in this state, and when within a short distance of his own residence, his wife, who was at home with seven children, hearing of her husband's approach left the house with the youngest child in her arms to meet him, leaving the other six, (the oldest about 14 years of age,) at home. During her absence the house took fire and all within was consumed. Nothing was to be seen on the return of the mother but the smoking relics of her late habitation, in which were then found the charred remains of her six unfortunate children. Out of a family of nine, the mother and one infant remain alone unhurt; yet what must be that mother's anguish? In one short day six of her children are taken from her, she receives a returning husband mutilated and almost lifeless, and becomes houseless.—Such are the details of the distressing occurrences so far as we have been able to gather them from authentic sources, and we hope it may never fall to our lot again to describe so sad an event.
