

CHICAGO, Ill., October 25th.—The City Council has passed resolutions, nullifying the act of Congress respecting the Fugitive Slave law, and releasing the police from obedience to it. This act of the city authorities has caused excitement. Last night, four or five thousand people assembled, the Mayor presiding, and senator Douglas made a powerful speech, sustaining the act of Congress in passing the Compromise bills, and particularly the Fugitive Slave bill. This speech had a powerful effect upon the meeting, and caused a change in public opinion in favor of the law, and against the acts of the City Council.

There will be a Public meeting of the Total Abstinence Society on Wednesday evening (To-morrow) held in Connell's Hall, when a number of gentlemen will address the meeting. Doors open at seven o'clock.

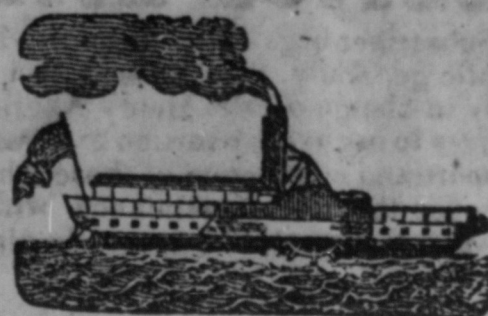
