THE PEOPLE OF CARLETON AND THE FREDERICTON SUFFERERS BY FIRE.—We copy below the spirited proceedings had at a Public Meeting held at Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, for the relief of the sufferers by the late conflagration in this City. The conduct of our Carleton neighbors on this occasion is beyond all praise. They have, unsolicited, come to the aid of the destitute with their money, and what is equal to, if not better than money, large quantities of provisions, which are being distributed under the direction of the Committee, to those parties who but for the timely aid of the Carletonians might have found difficulty in procuring food. The benevolent donors will have their reward in the heart-felt prayers, for their prosperity, of many a poor person whose necessities have been relieved by their generosity.—*Id.*

CLOSING OF THE NAVIGATION.—The River opposite this City froze over during last night, and the ice, with the exception of that along the shore, is now stationary. The Steamers Reindeer and Forest Queen were telegraphed as having left St. John yesterday for this City, the former at 10 o'clock, a. m., and the latter at 12 o'clock, noon. They could not, probably, have come further than Gagetown, as the river is closed for miles below the Oromocto.—*Id.* Nov. 27.

A PERILOUS SITUATION.—On the afternoon of Wednesday last, while the ice was forming on the river, and while it was yet moving downwards with the current, a man was heard calling for help, being then about one third the way from the Douglas side of the River. He was endeavouring to work a skiff across, but was rapidly drifting downwards. Every effort was made both by the Officers and Men of the 97th Regt., and the Citizens to rescue him; but the dark night closed in, and a cold sleety rain commenced falling. During the whole night, as he passed downwards, the efforts to save him were continued, but all without avail; and it was not until nine o'clock next morning that he was brought ashore on the Fredericton side, about a mile below the City. He was dreadfully exhausted, having frequently given himself up for lost, and again raised himself from the tempting death-sleep usual on such occasions. The sufferer turned out to be

Mr. David Thompson, wheelwright of this City; and what is very extraordinary, he is not frozen although he had on neither over coat nor mittens.—*Fredericton Reporter.*

REMOVAL OF THE SEAT OF GOVERNMENT.—The Fredericton papers one and all seem very sore when any mention is made of transferring the Seat of Government to this City. They may make themselves very easy on this point, a great part of the population of St. John not being of opinion that the influence of our mercantile community would be very salutary. FATAL CASUALTY.—On Thursday night last, Mr. John Bent, master, and part owner of the schooner *Crown*, from Annapolis, met with his death, it is supposed, by accident, as the body was found next morning under the schooner, which had partially grounded, at the Market Slip. He was heard pumping about twelve o'clock that night. The remains, which were somewhat mutilated, were sent over to his friends at Granville, by the Steamer, which left here this morning.—*St. John Courier.*

The Cape Breton Giant, Angus McKaskill, arrived here on Tuesday, in the steamer *Gipsy*, from Annapolis, and exhibited himself last evening, for the first time in this city. He is certainly a prodigy, and well entitled to the appellation of a giant, his height being 7 feet 3 1/2 inches. He is extremely well proportioned. He will hold his second levee at the Institute this evening.—*New Brunswicker.*

ST. ANDREWS AND QUEBEC RAILROAD.—It is with much satisfaction, that we give publicity to the fact, that the Engine and Tender, together with the rails &c., for our Railroad, have been shipped as will be seen by the following extract of a letter from the Secretary of the English Board of Directors to the Board, in this place, dated

London, November 1st, 1850.

"I have much pleasure in informing you, that the ship 'Ansdaie,' has or is just about sailing, with a part of the Rails, Nails and Screws, and the ship 'Avon,' has been engaged and will sail in a few days, with the rest of the Iron, Nails, Screws, and Switches, with the Engine and Tender."

This is truly pleasant and gratifying news, to the friends of the Road here, who will we hope have the pleasure of seeing that part which is completed, in operation this fall.—*St. Andrews Standard, Nov. 20.*
