Just as we expected, Lord John Russell is beginning to shrink from the responsibility of meeting the Papal question with that manly independence which should characterize the actions of a British Statesman and a true Patriot. The representatives of the Irish Papists, the men whom Lord John Russell's Government had hitherto been so favourable to,—whose religion had been fostered and endowed at the expense of the nation,—when they discovered that his Lordship meditated an enactment which had for its object, the restraining and controlling of the arrogance and assumption of their intolant Priesthood, turned round like the serpent in the fable, and stung the hand that fed them.

The Russell Ministry, although reinstated in power, is still in a state of beggarly impotency, having been defeated on two or three occasions since their re-assumption of power; and it is generally believed that a dissolution of Parliament will soon take place, and with it a breaking up of the power of the Whigs to form an Administration. It will be a grand day for England and her Colonies that the Whig-radicals will be obliged to relinquish their abused power. In the mean time, in anticipation of an approaching election, the Protectionists are busy in the endeavor to secure a majority to carry the measures which may be regarded as necessary to the prosperity of the Kingdom.

The sooner the desirable change takes place, the better. The reflective portion of the people are beginning to realize all the fallacies of Whig misrule, including Free Trade, and all the other visionary experiments of the present government. It is time the men were kicked out of office, who have done so much towards the ruin of the Empire,—the men who have shewn themselves, on all occasions, incompetent to rule. The Whigs and Radicals are the men who encourage treason and discourage and persecute loyalty. They are the men who would reduce the army and navy, and leave the nation defenceless in order that they might gratify their longing for national change and incipient socialism.—We rejoice when we think that their days are numbered; for we believe that the nation will have great cause to exult in their downfall.—*Bytown (C.
