

GRASS SEED.—We were informed the other day, that in the thriving settlement of Harvey, in York County, there are not less than one thousand bushels of Herdsgrass seed of native production, for sale. No circumstances can be of greater importance to the farming interest of the country, than that of being able to compass the means of getting pure grass seed. Too long have our fields been overrun with the spurious stuff sold us, under the name of herds grass seed by our acute neighbours, but which, in reality, has only been a combination of sorrel, bull's eye, and other noxious stuff; as is fully shown by the foul state of the ground on the great body of our farms. The price asked for this seed, too, is less than that usually demanded by the Americans. The St. Stephen, St. David and St. James Agricultural Society have been supplied at from 15s to 15s 6d per bushel, delivered at the first named place.

Last year the Americans bought up nearly the whole of this valuable seed, and shipped it off to Boston, where it had acquired a character not possessed by any of their own growth, and where it commanded the highest price in the market.

We, really, feel delighted with the Harvey Settlers' management, in thus freeing us from our long continued and ruinous dependence upon Massachusetts for so essential an article as grass seed in bringing forward the farming interests; and would be much pleased to learn that in the ensuing Session the deserved notice is taken of it in the House.—*Charlotte Gazette.*
