

DEATH OF PRESIDENT TAYLOR.—A telegraphic message was received here yesterday, announcing the death of General Taylor, President of the United States, the evening previous. President Taylor was elected in November 1848, and took office on the 4th of March following, consequently he has only filled the Presidential chair about a year and four months. He was in his 66th year, and had been declining for some time. The Vice President, Millard Fillmore, Esq., will assume the duties of President until the end of the term, which will be in March, 1853. Mr. Fillmore was born in the State of New York in 1800, and consequently is now 50 years of age.

We learn from a correspondent that a splendid flag was presented to Lodge No. 51, in Richmond on Friday morning last. We will publish the address accompanying the presentation in our next.
