WOODSTOCK, DEC. 24, 1850.

The Head Quarters is down upon the Post Office Surveyor because there is no Mail to leave St. John from Friday evening until Monday evening during the winter, and none to be sent from Fredericton after Friday evening until Sunday evening; also for compelling the Post Master at Fredericton to open his office twice on a Sunday, while the Post Master General, his Deputies and Clerks, doing duty at St. John, are relieved from Sunday labour altogether.

We are unable to issue a whole sheet this week in consequence of the illness of two of our hands; we had however but little of importance to communicate; since our last there has been no arrival from England, and our exchanges contain nothing of importance.

TOTAL DESTRUCTION OF THE WOOLLEN MILL OF THE HAMILTON COMPANY.—The large Broad Cloth and Delaine Mill of the Hamilton Company, at Southbridge, in this State, was entirely consumed by fire, at seven o'clock

Sunday morning. The supposed loss is from \$175,000 to \$200,000. Insured for. Over 700 persons, dependant for subsistence upon this establishment, are thus rendered destitute at this inclement season. The cause of the fire is unknown. When first discovered it was breaking out of the roof in a number of places. There was, at the time of the fire, a large amount of raw material in the building, which was totally consumed.

It is stated that the Cunard Company intend building three new steamers of 2900 tons and 1050 horse power each—the Asia, the crack ship at present, being 2400 tons and 800 horse power.

SINGULAR AFFAIR.—Yesterday morning, the body of a woman was found in the Mill Pond, with her face covered with blood, and some severe marks and contusions on her person. An Inquest was held on view of the body yesterday, but it failed to elicit her name, where she belonged, or how she came to such an untimely end.
