"Immediately after the breaking up of the Peace Congress at Frankfort, Messra Joseph Sturge and Frederick Wheeler, of England, and Eliber Burritt, of America, proceeded to the seat of war, and called the attention of the beligerent parties to an old trenty between Denmark and the Duchies, which provides a court of Arbitration to settle all difficulties between the two countries. The Minister of Poreign Affairs for the Duchies has appointed asgentleman to meet whoever the Danish government will select to discuss the matter, and the peace makers ars sunguine of success. The London Times, as usual, ridicules the whole affair, and affects to be quite sarcasticattowards Mr. Burritt. Now it is quite possible that these philanthropists may fail to accomplish their object, but the fact that such an attempt has been made, and courteously listened to is one of great moment, and adds another to the many cheering indications of progress in Cut and Wrought NAILS, Griddles, Lime, &c. this aineteenth century. How would such an interference on the part of foreign and powerless individuals have been received in other, and not very long past times, by helligorent powers? The three peace-makers would have been treated as madmen or fools, and the reward of their labors would doubtless have been a prison or a halter .-Portland Transcript
