FREDERICTON, Monday, March 8, 1851.

On Saturday the Railway Bill was committed. The Speakers were Messrs. Street, Barbare, Johnston, Gray, the Speaker, English, and Harding. The friends of the Bill deprecated any further debate, but Messrs. Johnston and Barbare intimated that they would contest every phase of the measure.

Monday Evening, March 8.—The Railway Bill was again discussed. In spite of common sense and decorum the opponents to the Bill still on general principles decided last Tuesday 26 to 11. The speakers were Earl, Street, the Speaker, Needham, Hannington, McPherson, Harding, Botsford, Barbare, Cutler, Johnston, Wilmot, Pickard, English, Taylor, and Street. There was a great deal said about defining the line. All motions for localities withdrawn, except by English, who said the road would be a burden on the Province, but he would go for it if carried to the Grand Falls on the West side of the river, otherwise he would oppose it. Barbare moved an amendment to the first resolution, leaving the route an open question from Quebec to the Bend, to be decided by Commissioners, which was lost 27 to 8. Minority—Barbare, Montgomery, Reid, Gordon, Johnston, Cutler, McPhelim, and English. The first section was then carried 26 against 9. Ayes—The Speaker, Street, Partelow, Wilmot, Gray, Hayward, Hannington, Johnston, Scoullar, Lewis, Harding, Botsford, Rice, Stiles, Goddard, Taylor, McPherson, Ryan, Needham, Robinson, Porter, Thompson, McPhelim, McLeod, Fitzgerald, and Chapman. Nays—Montgomery, Barbare, Earle, Gilbert, Cutler, Johnston, Reid, Gordon, and Pickard. Johnston moved an amendment to the second section that instead of this Province paying five-twelfths of the expense, we build five-twelfths the distance. Negativated 22 to 7. English and Gilbert not voting the second section was carried 22 to 10. Progress reported.

Tuesday, March 9.—House on Railway debate at half past 10. There was a debate of 4 hours on the 3rd section. Scoullar moved an amendment that the proceeds of lands be spent for the exclusive benefit of this Province, which was lost 26 to 10, and the resolution was sustained 24 to 13. Beardsley and English both voted against it. Beardsley then moved for the reconsideration of the 1st section, and wished to insert that the line touch the Grand Falls, Woodstock, and Fredericton—lost 28 to 7. Johnston moved an amendment to the fourth section, that the two houses elect commissioners by ballot, only Johnston and Harding for it. Beardsley moved a new section that no member of the House be employed on the Railway, which was carried without division. The next 7 sections passed with very little opposition. Progress reported.

Wednesday, March 10.—The Railway Bill was committed this morning, and one or two additional sections added by the consent of the Government. Debate on filling up the blank that the Loan should not exceed so much—Sum fixed at fifteen hundred thousand pounds sterling. The Loan Bill was then committed and soon passed. Johnston moved to exempt the revenues of northern counties from the Pledge—lost 24 against 6. Minority—Johnston, Montgomery, Barbare, Williston, Cutler, and McPhelim.

The Mining Bill was committed and discussed. This Bill provides that present lessees of Mines may enter on private property by paying damages. If parties can't agree, a jury living 10 miles or more distant to assess damages. No provision was made defining the rights of future lessees. The 1st section sustained by an overwhelming majority. Progress reported.

Thursday, March 11.—Mining Bill passed. A bill regulating the proceeding in Courts of Copartnership committed. Progress reported. Nothing else done. The Railway Bill was discussed in the Council on Saturday.

Friday, March 12.—House in committee today and passed the Haematac Bill. Then in committee on School Bill. Progress reported.

The Council have taken up the Railway Bills and it is supposed they will get through tomorrow.

Saturday, March 13.—The House went into

committee to-day on several local bills, and passed a bill to increase the stock of the Saint John Water Company.

In committee on the School Bill. The Attorney General abandoned the clause for three Provincial Inspectors, and yielded to the general opinion of the House, and was willing to adopt the plan of country or district Inspectors, but insisted on a general Superintendent. Progress reported. There was a discussion in the Council on the Railway Bill. Progress was reported. It is supposed they will get through on Monday.

St. John, Tuesday, March 9.—The steamer Maid of Erin left this morning for Portland, (first trip for the season) full of passengers, many of whom are young men destined for California.

Arrival of the Asia.

Boston, March 12, 1852.

The Asia arrived at New York to-day. Cotton had advanced 1-8d. Flour and Wheat were firm. The people were anxiously awaiting the general election. Lord Derby in the House of Lords on the 17th spoke against the Reform Bill as giving too great toleration. The political world are in favor of the peace policy. Some papers say that Lord Derby is a firm Protectionist, and others assert that his speech is a covert abandonment of that policy.

Lord Naas is secretary for Ireland. The House of Commons had adjourned till the 12th inst.

Russia has forbidden France and Austria interfering in the treaty of Vienna, and all are shewing their teeth.

The Queen of Spain had completely recovered, and was attending Bull Fights, &c.
