NEW ORLEANS, 13th April.—The Picayune received advices from Mexico to the 29th ult., the Foreign Minister had protested against the tariff issued by Governor Aralos at Matamoros and a large number of Merchants had also refused to acknowledge it or pay the duties it imposed—much excitement prevailed in consequence, and trouble it was feared would ensue.

HARTFORD, 13th, 6 p. m.—The walls of a building in Kingsley Street, occupied by a hose company, fell, burying five children beneath the ruins, two of whom have died, two others lie in a hopeless condition, while the fifth will probably recover.

CHARLESTON, 13th, 6 p. m.—Rufus Green, secretary of the Fire Insurance Company at Mobile has been convicted of forgery.

SAVANNAH, 13th.—Lamars Cotton Warehouse containing five thousand Bales of Cotton, several Presses &c, was destroyed by fire on Sunday, the presses cost 50,000 dollars! The ship Jane Hammond, loaded with Cotton, was aground near, and was nearly consumed, the Isabella was also injured. The whole loss is stated at 300,000 dollars! mostly insured.

We regret to notice the death of Mr. George R. M. Wetmore, son of Charles P. Wetmore Esq., of Fredericton, at Cooper's Wells, Mississippi, on the 9th March. He was returning home from the West Indies, where he had been on account of ill health. He was a young man of much promise, and had gained the esteem of all who knew him.—Courier.

Mr. Thompson, Surgeon, British R. N., the inventor of the naval telegraphic lights, has submitted a plan to the lords commissioners of the Admiralty by which candles and oil may forever be dispensed with. This is accomplished by a simple and very ingenious method of using the slush from salt meats, now of no use. Her Majesty's ship Impregnable, flag-ship Devonport, has been lighted from stem to stern on this new plan. The men in each ship, in place of having one dip of thirty-four to the pound, have now a light for six hours equal to sixteen dips, and from which, by the aid of a parabolic reflector, they are enabled to read thirty feet off.

The mail screw steamer, fitted out by Captain Blathen to search for Sir John Franklin, has been declared ready for sea. The proposed field of search is east of the meridian of Behrings Straits, towards Keller's discoveries in 1849, Herald Island, and New Siberia.

A bill has been introduced into Congress by Mr. McMullen, of Virginia, giving to members of Congress a salary of \$1,500 a year, instead of the present allowance of \$8 a day. The substitution of a fixed salary for the present per diem would tend very much to shorten the sessions and save a vast deal of money to the treasury.—International Journal.

The Boston Post says—"Of 78 towns heard from in Maine, it is known that seventy three have at their recent meetings virtually decided against the Maine liquor law." This is so notoriously false, that we wonder even the Post should have the hardhood to publish it. The towns have decided in favor of the law in the ratio of three to one.—Portland Transcript.

The city of New York is prosecuting a suit against a ship owner, for the sum of sixty-eight cents, the costs on which have already reached \$300! Truly, law is like physic, those that take least of it are best off.—Ib.
