

A new coin designated the Florin, in value one-tenth of a pound, has been issued from the Mint. It is described as having for "The obverse an effigy crowned, with the inscription 'Victoria, D. G.: Brit.: Reg. F. D., and the date of the year; and for the reverse, the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom, contained in four shields, crosswise, each shield surmounted by the royal crown, with the rose in the centre and in the compartments between the shields the national emblems of the rose, thistle, and shamrock, surrounded by the words 'One Florin one-tenth of a pound,' and with a milled graining round the edge.

THE END OF FOLLY.—The wife of Michael Cait, a resident of Decker township, in Indiana, was shot on Monday of last week by her son-in-law, a Mr. Young, to whom she approached disguised as an apparition. Mr. Young had been previously conversing about the spiritual rappings, ghosts, &c., and it is probable was much excited on supernatural subjects at the time. Mrs. C., in a mood of merriment, showed herself to him, when he seized his gun and fired at her. The ball passed through her neck, and occasioned death in a short time.

THE PRIME MINISTER'S OPINION OF RESPONSIBLE GOVERNMENT IN A COLONY.—HOUSE OF LORDS, Tuesday, April 6th.—The Earl of Derby presented a petition from the Speaker of the House of Assembly at Newfoundland, praying for the extension of Responsible Government to that Island. He totally differed from the prayer of the Petition. If they wanted to ruin the peace and welfare of that Colony, they could not do it more effectually, than by granting the prayer of this Petition.

A LEGISLATIVE ROW.—On Thursday last, in the Ohio House of Representatives, a disreputable scene occurred between two of the members, Messrs Weller and Beckel, who after making free use of not very choice language, resorted to sand-boxes, which each hurled violently at the head of the other, until the intervention of the Sergeant-at-Arms compelled them to suspend hostile operations.—*Boston Herald.*

Rueben Edmunston, better known as "Jack Bowers," the most noted thief in the Mississippi Valley, died at Saint Louis on the 16th inst.—He was sixty-three years of age, and stated in a confession which he made just before his death, that he had been arrested one hundred and fifteen times, and incarcerated in various prisons sixty-one times.

The Ticket Master, at the Salmon Falls station, on the Boston and Maine Railroad, has absconded with about \$7,600 of the Company's funds. He paid all his debts before leaving, and left the amount of his bond in the hands of his bondsmen. A grudge against the Company appears to have been the cause of his leaving.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.—The intelligence from the Cape is to the effect that the British troops had nearly completed the destruction of the Kafir's crops. This mode of warfare appeared to astound them, and they had complained bitterly of it. Hostilities have been renewed, and there was at the latest accounts but slight hopes of a speedy termination to this harassing war.

RAISING POULTRY.—A person in Burlington county, N. J., from the 1st of Nov. last to the 1st of April, collected two hundred and eleven thousand one hundred and eighty-one pounds, costing twenty-three thousand two hundred and thirty dollars; and the whole was sent to New York market. The whole of this poultry was collected within an extent of 12 miles square.

The French vessel the Seine, Captain Platt, was completely destroyed by fire in the Bay of Mobile, on the 19th March, just as it was about to leave for Havre with a cargo of 3000 bales of cotton.

King Oscar, of Sweden, has again adjourned his coronation as king of Norway till next year, when the ceremony will take place in the Cathedral of Tronhem.
