

ROTHSCHILD THE HEAD OF ISRAEL.—The Paris correspondent of the N. Y. Evangelist writes as follows:

"Strange news reaches us from Constantinople. I should not mention these rumors, if something similar had not been announced three years ago. I quote the reports without guarantying their truth. "Syria has been ceded to M. Rothschild for five hundred millions of francs. It is not yet known whether he assumes the title of King or Pacha; it is certain that he proposes to rebuild Jerusalem and the temple of Solomon; there are to be chapels for all religions, a line of steamers from Beyrout to Marseilles, and a railway from Alexandria to Constantinople. The new states of M. Rothschild abound in iron ore and forests of valuable timber. It is said that M. Rothschild will appeal to his co-religionists to return to the land of their fathers, to possess the tents of Abraham and Jacob."
