M., for the purpose of the said Election, of which all persons will take notice and govern themselves accordingly; and in case a Poll shall be then and there demanded, I do hereby further Proclaim and give Public Notice that Polling Booths will be opened on Monday the 18th inst., at 8 o'clock, A. M., and continue open until 4 o'clock P. M., of the same day at the following places, viz:—

DISTRICT No. I.—To comprise the Freeholders of the Front Tier of Lots in the Parish of Woodstock and the whole Parish of Northampton, and who shall assemble at the Court House in the Shire Town.
DISTRICT No. II.—To comprise the remaining part of the Parish of Woodstock, and the Freeholders are to assemble at the place commonly called Richmond Corner.

DISTRICT No. III.—To comprise the Parish of Wakefield and that part of the Parish of Brighton lying to the Southward of the Becaguinic Stream, and the Freeholders thereof will assemble at the place commonly called Victoria Corner.
DISTRICT No. IV.—To comprise the Parish of Simonds, and the remaining part of the Parish of Brighton lying to the Northward of said Becaguinic, and the Freeholders thereof shall assemble at or near the Big Presqu'isle River.
