No person shall be allowed to compete unless a Member who has paid in his yearly subscripthe property of another.

All Stock exhibited for Premium (Stallions Bulls, Boars, and Rams, excepted, and which must have been owned at least one year by the competitor,) must have been raised in the County, and all stock exhibited that has not been raised by the competitor must have been owned by him, exclusively, for not less than three months prior to the day of exhibition; and all Grain, Root Crops, or other articles whatever exhibited, must have been grown or manufactured by the competitor or directly under his superintendance, within the year in which such articles are exhibited, and all manufactures shall be perfectly new.

No person shall be allowed to exhibit any animal in a two-fold capacity, nor receive more than one premium on animals or articles of the same kind or class.

Cattle Pens and other arrangements will be made on the ground for the safe keeping of all animals exhibited, and halters must be furnished by the owners.

Animals and articles for exhibition must be entered with the Secretary not later than the Saturday previous to the day of the Show, who will present each competitor with a numbered card, corresponding to the entry in his book, which must be attached to the article when exhibited.

All animals and articles for exhibition must be on the ground by 10 o'clock, A. M., when a Committee will be in attendance to assign to each its proper place, where it must remain till the close of the exhibition.

The Committee are requested to be on the ground on the morning of the Show by half-past nine o'clock, for making the necessary arrangements. The Exhibition will open at 10 1-2

The judges will be at liberty to withhold any premium if the animal or article be deficient in merit. Competent judges will be appointed on the morning of the Show.

RIOT IN BELFAST .-- LOSS OF LIFE.

The Belfast Mercury, of Wednesday has the following account of an alarming and fatal riot, which took place in that town, and which appears to partake of a sectarian character :-

One of the most fatal affrays that has occurred in Belfast for a long period, took place yesterday evening, it was still more lamentable than the York-street riot, both in character and consequences. The origin of the affray seems almost unknown to any person, but so far as we can learn, it arose altogether out of the circumstances of the previous evening in Cullingtreeroad. A number of Roman Catholics and Protestants who inhabited that street had quarrelled, but the matter seemed to have been quelled. The girl M'Laughlin, who was wounded in that affray, having been removed to the hospital, a rumour of her death was circulated among the Roman Catholic population of Barrack-street and Cullingtree-road and round about Old Pound. Whether by pre-concert we cannot say, but almost in a mass they turned out, and commenced to wreck the houses of the Protestant inhabitants in the Cullingtree-road. This having reached the Orangemen of Sandy-row, they assembled at once to defend their friends, and the two parties meeting, a most fearful engagement ensued Both parties appeared to be prepared for a determined encounter, as a vast number of them were armed with guns and pistols; those who were not so armed tore down brickbats from the dead walls, and gathered stones from every quarter. The commencement of the riot was about eight o'clock in the evening, and it began so suddenly that before tion before the 1st of September, and in no case | the constabulary were aware several thousands shall any person be allowed to offer as his own were fighting in Durham-street and up to Millstreet. The balls were flying like hail, and the aspect of the people was murderous. It was quite impossible for the constabulary to make head against the determination evinced on both sides, and even could they have succeded for a little, they would have been immediately overwhelmed by reinforcements that poured into the Roman Catholic party from Mullan's-corner .--In the mean time, fighting was going on in Carcick hill. The rioters were armed with grapes, pitch-forks, spades, shovels and every weapon that could be laid on. It was apparently the
