

The U. S. Mail steamer Pacific arrived at N. York August 8th, with Liverpool dates to the morning of the 28th July. The Africa arrived out the 25th, Sarah Sands 26th. Kossuth left the same evening for London. The Parliamentary elections were completed with the exception of five seats. The Times reckons the number of seats secured at 626, of which 325 are considered ministerial, and 301 opposition. Ministerial papers, however, claim a majority of 40 to 50, which they declare sufficient to carry on the Government. Continental news to unimportant. The Turkish Government are to pay \$30,000 demanded by the British Charge for outrages committed on a party of passengers from a steamer.

THE LATE INDIAN MASSACRE. Louisville, July 27.—A government express arrived at Fort Smith on the 17th inst. bringing intelligence of the total destruction of the United States military expedition to the head waters of the Red river, and the massacre of Capt. Marcy and 80 men, by the Camanche and Kiony Indians. The Indians were 1000 strong, and fought the troops all day. Capt. Strain, Dr. Marcy, and J. K. Snyder, of New York, are also reported to have been killed. It is also reported that the Indians intend to attack Fort Arbuckle and the other posts on the Brazos. The Camanches, it is said, were on their way to attack the posts on the Brazos when they met Capt. Marcy and his troops. They were invited into the camp, received presents, and left at night, running off all the horses and mules. The next morning the attack was made. Great excitement and fear prevail on the frontier. Captain Marcy, whose death is mentioned above, belonged to the 5th Regiment of U. States Infantry. He was a native of New Hampshire.

Honolulu dates of 31st May give particulars of a very destructive fire, by which Capt. B. Snow, an extensive commission merchant, lost property, principally belonging to his consignees, to the amount of \$50,000. Mr. Davis and McIntyre & Co. were also large losers. Mr. Lasette lost an entire cargo of China goods, which had been sold at auction, but not delivered to purchasers.

MAD DOGS.—A mad dog was seen on Yonge Street, near Yorkville, early yesterday morning. It bit several other dogs, which were instantly shot; the mad dog was also fired at, and wounded, but it contrived to make its escape, though probably it has since died, as it was not seen afterwards. This is the second dog which has been seen there, in a rabid state this season.—Toronto Patriot, 4th inst.

H. M. Steam Sloop Basilisk, another of the fleet intended for the protection of the Fisheries, arrived at Halifax, on Saturday morning last, in twenty-three days from Portsmouth, England.

RIGHT.—Thomas Collyer, one of the owners of the Henry Clay, has been arrested in New York, charged with causing, by misconduct and negligence, the death of Miss Julia Hay, one of the passengers lost from that steamer. He was held in \$10,000 bail. Warrants have been issued for the officers of the boat.

IMMIGRATION.—Four hundred young women will be landed this morning from the Roderick Dhu, and will march in procession to the Immigration Office.—Quebec Chronicle.

Among the sufferers by the burning of the steamer Henry Clay, we find the names of Mrs. Marcher, aged 57 years, and her son, Mr. G. K. Marcher, of New York. Mrs. M. was daughter of the late Seth Seely, Esq. of this city.—St. John Courier.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—A house was burned at Sackville, last week, belonging to Mr. Charles Balmer. His daughter and two grand-children perished in the flames.—C. Vis.

SUDDEN DEATH FROM TAKING CHLOROFORM. The Worcester Spy of Monday says that the life of John Davis, Holden, who was suffering from a severe tooth-ache, induced her physician to let her inhale chloroform, for the purpose of having it extracted, when, upon inhalation, she expired immediately.
