

"THE JACKSON JOB!"

The following despatches from Quebec to Mr. Howe are worthy of note, and will doubtless put our Government on the look out. If the charges are incorrect they will be contradicted, if true we see trouble ahead.

Quebec, 1st April, 1853.

As Directors of the Quebec and Richmond Road we think right to warn you that Jackson's agents set Board at defiance, change grades as they please, Masonry Culverts, Contrary to contract, rubbish of stone for large bridges, and now issued orders that Engineers be turned off line, protest served accordingly, immense trouble expected in getting good road. On Saturday morning last he was playing with some children near the old fence in the rear of the Gaol when a large portion of it fell upon him, and crushed him so badly that he died almost immediately. "Victoria Adelaide, Princess Royal, born November 21, 1840; Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, born November 9, 1841; Alice Maud Mary, born April 25, 1843; Alfred Ernest born May 5, 1849; Louisa Caroline, born March 5, 1848; Arthur Patrick, born May 1, 1850; [Jim born April, 1853.] All of these children are carefully trained under the supervision of their parents, and the family of the Queen is one of the best governed in England.

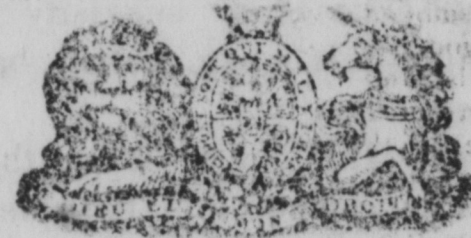
