NOTICE TO PERSONS WHO HAVE APPLIED FOR CHILDREN FROM ENGLAND.

GOVERNMENT EMIGRATION OFFICE, St. John, 21st April, 1853. The copy of a Despatch to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, has this day been received, announcing that the proposed emigration of Children from England to this Province, will not take place. The following is the concluding paragraph of the Despatch, which is dated Downing Street, 29th March, 1853, "Considering, therefore, the difficulties and dangers of executing the plan, and seeing that after all, there is no prospect that it could be carried to any such extent as to be of importance to the interests of the Province, I do not think that it ought to be prosecuted further." (Signed) NEWCASTLE. Persons in all parts of the Province who have made application for children from England, will please take notice that such cannot now be furnished. M. H. PERLEY, H. M.
