bound to lay before the Council. At a former meeting an account had passed the Council for £5, in favor of John Stevens, and he the Secretary Treasurer, was directed to pay the same, which he did to G. W. Cleary, Esq., who had presented an order from Stevens for that amount, some time after, Stevens in a conversation with him stated that Mr. Cleary had fined one Samuel Holmes £3, for selling liquor without a license, that he, Stevens, was indebted to Holmes in the sum of £3, and had given Mr. Cleary the order to receive the amount due from Holmes, and that Mr. Cleary had kept the amount of the fine instead of leaving it in the Bank to the credit of the County.

Mr. Gallop thought that proceedings should be taken against all defaulters at once, they were now, perhaps, as well able to pay as they ever would be, and the sooner they were looked after the better.

Mr. Dibblee said the first thing to be done was to ascertain what amounts were due the County, and from whom, this done they should call upon the parties for payment, and if refused, they should represent them to the Government, and failing in this, their claims on defaulters would be as good as ever, and they could take such other steps as might be considered necessary.

Mr. Harding would repeat that in his opinion a committee of the whole should be set at work, they could ferret out nearly all due the County, he knew of several sums that had been collected, and he thought they could soon hunt up more.

Mr. Jones said the Magistrates had been applied to time after time, but have paid no attention to the applications, he would now go for suing them as soon as it could be ascertained who were the defaulters and to what amount they were indebted.

On motion of Mr. Harding,

The Board was appointed a Committee to obtain information as to the amounts due the County, and to prepare a representation to the Government of all defaulters.

A list of Parish officers for the Parish of Wicklow, elected for the ensuing year was read, when Mr. Kerr moved that another Road Commissioner be added to the list, those elected all living in the upper part of the Parish.

Mr. Lindsay said the law limited the number of Commissioners to three and the Council had no power to add any more.

Mr. Harding enquired if the voting had been by ballot, and on being informed that it had not, he said the election was illegal as the law said the voting must be by ballot, the Council therefore had the power of making the appointments if they chose.

List approved.

Mr. Dibblee moved a resolution to pass a by-law, to regulate Assessments for Schools in districts, where the assessment principle had been adopted, and for the appointment of Assessors and Collectors in each district, when and where the same is adopted. He said much difficulty was experienced for the want of such a law. People met and expressed a willingness to be taxed for school purposes, but they have no authority for appointing Assessors or Collectors, and a law was required to give them that power.

Passed.

Parish lists from several Parishes read and approved.

Mr. Upton presented a petition from Mathew Corbet one of the assessors of Simonds, praying that the sum of £1 0 7 might be granted to him, being one third of the Assessors fees.

Mr. Upton stated that Mr. Corbet had been at some considerable trouble in this matter, he could not attend at the moment the other Assessors wished him, and they had made out the roll without him, which gave great dissatisfaction to the people. The Assessors had before went round to ascertain as near as possible how to assess, and he had done so now, but the others did not, hence the dissatisfaction.

Mr. Gallop said if Mr. Corbet had not performed the duty, he had no right to the pay. Mr. Jones said that Mr. Corbet had not attended until the assessment roll had been made out, he did not know that Assessors were compelled to go round and collect information as to what amount each man should be taxed, if

any one was over taxed it was his own fault, and he had his remedy, he would not go for paying a man who had not done his duty.

Mr. Harding said the assessment roll was signed by Mr. Corbet, and if he had not performed his duty, his name would not have been there, he was entitled to a share of the fees.

Mr. Gallop said if Mr. Corbet or Mr. anybody else did not do his duty, he should not receive his pay. Mr. Corbet had not done his, and was not entitled to pay.

Mr. Lindsay said it was not proper to tax a sworn officer with neglect of duty.

Mr. Gallop said he had that officers own words for it, his petition states that he had not performed the work, and he of course was not entitled to pay.

Mr. Dibblee would like to know why this petition had been sent in, did the other Assessors refuse to pay Mr. Corbet, or what was the trouble? The Council had no information before them to act upon; the better way was to leave the matter in the hands of the Councilors from that Parish, it might turn up that no objection was made to pay Mr. Corbet, if so the time of the Council will have been taken up for nothing. He would move that the matter be referred to the Councilors from Simonds.

Carried.
