THE LIVERPOOL FLEET FOR AUSTRALIA .-The total number of vessels now preparing for the various ports in Australia is 55, and the total amount of registered tonage is 28,505. The sailings from this port to the Australian colonies during the past week have been nine vessels, of an aggregate tonage of 5,192 tons, as follows :-

For Port Philip, 1 vessel of 403 tons; Melbourne, 5 vessels, 645 tons; Melbourne and Geelong, 1 vessel, 1000 tons; and Sydnev, 2 vessels, 2,144 tons.—Liverpool paper.
