

ENGLISH NEWS.

Arrival of the Baltic.

(By Telegraph via Montreal Lane)

NEW YORK, May 2d.—The "Baltic" arrived at 5 1-2 o'clock, P. M. yesterday. She left Liverpool Wednesday, 20th ult., at 5 o'clock, P. M. Her news is not of much importance.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer's Financial statement has appeared.

Mrs. Beecher Stowe was mingling in the religious circles of Glasgow and Edinburgh, being received with great enthusiasm. She will probably remain in Great Britain until August.

The Screw Steamer "Geneva" Capt. Patton, sailed from Liverpool at 5 o'clock, on the evening of Tuesday, the 19th ult., for Quebec and Montreal direct, with full compliment of passengers and large cargo.

The Austrian Government has refused to entertain the declaration of Sardinia respecting the confiscation of the property of the Lombard Refugees.

In the House of Lords on the 18th inst., a motion by the Earl of Winchelsea, for a Committee to enquire into the system of the Roman College of Maynooth, was rejected by a Vote of 110 to 20.

In the House of Commons the Chancellor of the Exchequer brought forward his Financial Statement, in a speech of nearly five hours' duration. The first part of it related to the revenue and expenditure of the Country. In 1852 the revenue of the year was estimated £51,625,000, but at the year's end the actual revenue exceeded that estimate by £1,640,000. In like manner the expenditure in April, 1852, was estimated at £51,163,000, but had only been £50,783,000. In the House of Commons the Chancellor of the Exchequer also adverted to the Exchequer Loan Fund, which it is not at present intended to abolish. He next discussed the Income Tax. In its present form it pressed unequally on classes, and while freely desiring its adjustment, he confessed the greatest difficulty in framing any modification—What the Government aimed at doing was to introduce such present modification between incomes arising from property and those arising from skill. To mark the tax as a temporary one and take the ground for Parliament if it deemed fit to dispense with it at a future period. With this view the Government proposed to renew the tax for two years from April, 1853, at the present rate of 7d. per pound, on all incomes for two years more from April, 1855, at 6d., and for three years more from April, 1857, at 5d., so that the tax might expire in April, 1866. In addition to this, it is stated to make all incomes amounting to £100 to pay a tax at the rate of 5d. and all above £150 to pay the rate of 7d. and the tax to be extended to Ireland. Legacy duties to be extended to all successions. The exemption in favor of real property is to be done away with. It is further proposed to increase the duties on spirits.

STILL LATER.

NEW YORK, May 5.—The Asia with dates to 23rd ult., arrived at this port this morning.

The Earl of Clarendon, in the House of Lords, on the pending question with the United States as to the Fisheries, said the British squadron would cruise in the Fishing grounds the same as last year.

It is said that Menshikoff the Russian Ambassador had threatened to leave if matters were not brought to a settlement.

A conspiracy had been discovered in Hanover, and several arrests had been made.

Raspail has been pardoned with the condition that he leaves France immediately.

Another dissolution of the Spanish Ministry was announced. Joseph's friends are commencing a prosecution against the Times for libel.

SUNK BY GOLD.—Mr. Van Austen, one of the steamers Pemaquid's passengers fell overboard in the San Juan river on the last trip. He had so much gold about him that he never came up. The man-of-war's men of the Cyane fished three days for the body before they found it. It lay upon it \$1500 in gold.

GOVERNMENT EMIGRATION OFFICE, St. John, 21st April, 1853.

The copy of a Despatch to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, has this day been received, announcing that the proposed emigration of Children from England to this Province, will not take place. The following is the concluding paragraph of the Despatch, which is dated Downing Street, 29th March, 1853, "Considering, therefore, the difficulties and dangers of executing the plan, and seeing that after all, there is no prospect that it could be carried to any such extent as to be of importance to the interests of the Province, I do not think that it ought to be prosecuted further."
