**GREAT FIRE IN MONTREAL!!**

QUEBEC, July 12.—Montreal has been laid in ruins by a fearful fire, which raged from 10 A. M. on Thursday till Friday night. It originated in a stone building on Main Street, St. Lawrence Suburbs, and continued on downwards to the Montreal Gaol. The destruction of property is immense.

There are various estimates of the loss sustained. The Montreal Herald supposes the amount of insurance to be about £65,000, and and shewing that nearly 1100 houses have been consumed, and calculates the entire loss at £201,000. The Pilot says that 2000 houses have been destroyed, and the Gazette numbers them at 1200. The number of persons rendered homeless is from 1200 to 1500, and the total loss of property at £400,000.

Several splendid rows of buildings were totally consumed—among them Cornwall Terrace on Saint Denis Street, and Durham Terrace on St. Lewis Street. The Roman Catholic Church, known as the Bishop's Church, was burnt, together with the Bishop's Palace. Cinders from the fire in St. Lawrence Street lodged upon the roof of the out-houses attached to the Hayes House, latterly known as the Theatre, and in an instant the whole building was one sheet of flame, and notwithstanding the untiring exertions of the firemen was soon reduced to ashes. All the fine three story stone buildings on Dalhousie Square, including the Mess house and the residence of Geo. Moffatt, Esq., shared a like fate. St. Thomas' Church, and Molson's Brewery on St. Mary Street, were also consumed.—In the rear of Dalhousie Square the fire raged through Champ de Mars, thence in an irregular direction to Cauepeau Street. The Barracks in St. Paul and Commissioner Streets were in imminent danger, but were saved by blowing up some intervening buildings.

The sufferings of the homeless poor can be better imagined than described. The Government have appropriated only £500 for the immediate relief of the sufferers. The Montreal Corporation have voted £1000 for the immediate relief of those who are in want, and the Quebec Chronicle of this morning calls upon the City Fathers to vote a sum in aid of the sufferers, and a Meeting of the citizens is now being held to take measures for assisting Montreal in her difficulty, as she generously assisted us in ours.

The fire was purely accidental, and the dryness of the roofs, added to a scarcity of water, and to the blowing of a very high wind rendered human exertions almost useless in stopping the progress of the flames.

St. JOHN, July 15th.—The Government in Canada have placed £1500 at the disposal of the Relief Committee, for the immediate relief of the sufferers by the Montreal fire. Private subscriptions are to commence immediately.—The exact number of houses destroyed is now stated to be 1080—valued at £200,000, to which is to be added furniture, goods, and fixtures destroyed. Insurance ascertained at £68,225, and the Boston Traveller says of this the Aetna, Protection, and Hartford insurance companies together have £25,000. A subscription has been commenced at New York for the relief of the sufferers.

Some of the American papers state that the Hon. Daniel Webster will pass through this city and along the whole of the proposed line of Railway, and that H. M. steamship Devastation will be placed at his service for conveyance to Quebec from Pictou; also that it is supposed that he will be accompanied by Mr. Crampton the British Minister at Washington.

ANOTHER STEAMER!—A new stern wheel Steamer, intended to ply on the River above Fredericton, arrived yesterday from the United States. By a recent decision of the Law Officers of the Crown, it appears that American steamers may be imported and obtain a British register free of duty, while we can neither export our vessels to the United States, nor import ship-building materials and machinery without the imposition of a heavy duty. This is a description of Free Trade that we do not understand, and do not like; and the existence of such anomalies in our legislation shows a sad want of business talent in our rulers.—St. John Courier.

On Thursday, about 40 men, engineers and others, of the staff to be engaged on the St. Andrews and Woodstock Railway, arrived here by the "Speed," from England, and proceeded to St. Andrews. The works will now be prosecuted with energy.—St. John Freeman.
