

have returned to their works, and have permitted the Orangemen to land peaceably. The Hamilton men, accompanied by some from this city, left here (many of them armed) by the afternoon boat, and we learn by special telegraph to this office, that on landing, the leading Drummer of the Orangemen was seized by one of the navvies, and an attempt made to rescue the drum from him, which he resisted, when he was stabbed by one of the ruffians, whereupon the Orangemen fired, and some of their opponents were shot; but the precise numbers have not been telegraphed to us. The navvies were cleared, and all was quiet at 8 o'clock last night. We have not ascertained whether the wounds of any of the parties shot have proved mortal.—*Toronto (C. W.) Patriot, July 14.*

GREAT FIRE IN BOSTON!—Estimated loss over 300,000 dollars!!—One of the most destructive conflagrations which ever occurred in this city took place on Saturday afternoon, on Purchase, Belmont, and Broad streets, and the immediate vicinity, by which very many poor families have been turned from their homes, being able to save but a small portion of their limited stock of furniture, clothing, and household goods. The fire was first discovered about half past 3 o'clock, issuing from a nest of stables occupied by several teamsters, in rear of the large and elegant five story brick edifice, 99 Purchase, corner of Belmont street, known as the "Sailor's Home," erected at a cost of \$30,000, Mr. John O. Chaney, keeper. The wind was blowing fresh at the time from the Southwest, and the flames were driven with almost inconceivable velocity towards the "Sailor's Home," the Mariner's Church and the Boylston school house, two fine buildings, were also destroyed, together with a large number of houses and stores in Broad, Purchase, and Belmont sts., and Fort Hill.

The sight of the raging flames was as grand as it was terrific, and the fury with which they raged at once created a terrible panic in the whole neighborhood, which is densely populated with poor Irish and other families. Men, women and children were running to and fro in the greatest consternation, some engaged in removing their goods, others shrieking with fright and calling on the Almighty and the Virgin Mary to save their children and stay the progress of the flames, while hundreds of children were in the midst of the crowd, making their way they knew not where and crying most bitterly for their parents.—*International Journal.*

ENGLISH NEWS.

Arrival of the America.

By Telegraph to the Sentinel News Room.

HALIFAX, July 20, 8 P. M.—The steamer *America* from Liverpool has just arrived. The news is of but little importance.

ENGLAND.—The Parliamentary Elections are occupying their share of public attention. Most of the English Members have been returned, the results having yet to elect. The result so far is encouraging to the Government, but may be better when the Counties have polled.

There is now in the issue department of the Bank of England £21,780,000.

The British strangers recently imprisoned in Italy have arrived at Liverpool.

FRANCE.—Rumors of changes in the Ministry are again current.

The insurrection in Algeria appears to be suppressed for the present.

The *Moniteur* contradicts the statement that disaffection has been discovered in one of the Regiments of the line.

It is reported in London and Paris that Louis Napoleon has informed the British Government that he is prepared to admit certain English staples into France on easy terms, provided the British import duty on French wine is repealed.

TUSCANY.—A decree has just been promulgated at Florence subjecting to military discipline young men, who, owing to idle and irregular habits were a burthen to their families, and dangerous to public repose.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.—The steamship *Bosphorus* brings advices to the 19th May. The Kaffir War presents no new feature, and seems

to be as far from a termination as ever. Gen. Cathcart having established his head quarters at Fort Beaufort, and announced to the enemy that no terms would be listened to but submission, or retreat beyond the Kei river. More troops had been sent, the present force of the British being quite inadequate.

BY TELEGRAPH.

ST. JOHN, July 23rd, 11 o'clock, A. M.—The following dispatch has just been received from Calais:—

At 4 o'clock this morning one of the Mills on the English side of the river was discovered to be on fire. The wind being fresh at the time all efforts to stop the progress of the flames were unavailing. At this writing (9 o'clock) there have been destroyed seven single saw, five gang saw, and seven Lath Mills, owned by W. M. Porter, McFail, Staples, S. Wing, Heuston & Burnham, and D. & H. N. Hill; also some seven or eight dwelling houses and stores, 20 Railroad cars, and a large quantity of lumber. The loss already cannot be less than 50,000 dollars, and the fire is still raging. The Mills on the American side are safe as yet. The amount of insurance is not yet ascertained.
