

Mr. Giberson thought it a hard case, and if something were not done to prevent it, persons without property in the country would neither pay taxes nor work on the roads.

Mr. Estey was not willing that this should become a County charge, but the Commissioner should be paid back the sum he had expended in defending the suit.

Moved by Mr. Lloyd, seconded by Mr. —, That a warrant be issued to assess the Parish of Kent for the amount of the Judgment in the hands of the Commissioner.

Mr. Lindsay presented an account from J. D. Ketchum, for making out a list of Rate Payers for the Parish of Woodstock.

Mr. Dibblee presented a petition from Thos. Dalling and others in the Maduxnakik School District, Parish of Woodstock, praying that a warrant may issue to assess District No. 1 for £19, for the purpose of building a school house, and furnishing a stove.

Mr. Lloyd said some doubts existed in the minds of the people in his parish as to whether they should be subject to the School or Municipal Act in this matter.

Mr. Giberson presented a petition from the Trustees of Schools in the Parish of Kent praying that a warrant may issue to assess District No. 1 for £19, for the purpose of building a school house, and furnishing a stove.

Mr. Lloyd said some doubts existed in the minds of the people in his parish as to whether they should be subject to the School or Municipal Act in this matter.

Mr. Harding had no doubt but the meeting had been called, but he considered the Council entitled to as much respect as the Magistrates; if the matter had been brought before that body, the whole proceedings of the meeting would have been presented, and as the Council had made a rule that all these things should come before them in writing, he was not willing to depart from it.

Mr. Fitzherbert said he belonged to the Parish in which this District was situated; other petitions from the same Parish of a like nature would be presented, and he wished to see this one dealt with according to Law.

Mr. Fitzherbert was taxed three out of that 10 he thought the proceedings of the meeting should be before the Council.

On motion of Mr. Fitzherbert, seconded by Mr. Lloyd.

Resolved, That when the Trustees of Schools in District No. 1, in the Parish of Kent shall render a satisfactory statement of the proceedings of the meeting, signed by the inhabitants of said District, that the Secretary Treasurer shall issue a warrant of assessment for said District.

On Motion of Mr. Dibblee, seconded by Mr. Lindsay.

Resolved, That the Warden and Secretary Treasurer do sign orders in favor of parties holding claims against the County, and reported as due by the Committee appointed to audit the same at the meeting of the Council in July last, according to priority of date, that the same may be discharged forthwith, so far as the funds in hand will meet the same, except £20 due the Secretary Treasurer on account of his salary.

On motion of Mr. Harding, seconded by Mr. —,

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council it is advisable to petition the Government and Legislature, that it would be to the advantage of the Road service of this County, if the sum set apart by the Legislature for Bye Roads, should be granted to the Council to be by them divided and expended, as in the opinion of this Council, will be justice to the different sections thereof.

To which Mr. Lindsay moved, and Mr. Estey seconded the following amendment,

That the further consideration of this resolution be postponed to the next meeting of Council, and that the Councillors do in the mean time submit the matter to the people of the different Parishes at the elections for Councillors on the 28th inst., in order to get their views generally with regard to the question.

Resolved, That a Bye Law be prepared to authorize the Municipal Council to order assessments upon the several Parishes in the County of Carleton to meet Parish Contingencies

Moved by Mr. Clowse, seconded by Mr. Harding,

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council, the Act of Incorporation of the County should be amended, and that a Committee be appointed, to consist of One Member from each Parish, with the Member of the Legislative Council and the two Members of the Assembly with power to add to their number, to take into consideration the necessary amendments.

Moved by Mr. Estey, seconded by —,

Whereas doubts exist in the minds of many of the inhabitants of this County as to the legality of giving plumpers at the elections for Councillors.

Therefore Resolved, as the opinion of this Council, that such votes are legal.

Moved by Mr. Clowse, seconded by Mr. Harding,

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council there should be a Coroner in each Parish of this Municipality, and that a petition be forwarded to His Excellency praying the appointment of the same.
