

## ENGLISH NEWS.

## Arrival of the Canada.

ST. JOHN, August 17, 1852.—The Royal Mail steamer *Canada* arrived at Halifax at quarter before six on Monday evening, having sailed from Liverpool at half-past two, P. M. on the 7th inst.

The *Canada* brings 130 passengers and a full freight.

ENGLAND.—Domestic politics are extremely quiet, and will doubtless remain so until Parliament assembles in the beginning of October.

The American excitement respecting the action of our Government in the Fisheries has awakened much attention among all shades of politicians. The general opinion of the Press is in favor of the English reading of the treaty, but the Government is blamed by many of the leading journals for using a show of force without due previous notice. At the same time it is stated that the many ships of which a list is given in the Colonial papers, are no more than the usual fleet on the British American and W. Indian stations. The apprehended trouble has, however, caused considerable feeling, and with other circumstances has had a depressing effect on the funds.

The harvest is well begun in England, with seasonable weather, notwithstanding the accounts that potato rot had appeared in different parts of Ireland, it can only be regarded as partial, and at least counterbalanced by the abundance of the sound crop.

Continental news not important.

AUSTRALIA.—Advices from Port Philip direct to 22d April have been received, from which it appears that the production of gold was steadily increasing, and is now estimated at £100,000 stg. per week.

Trade is active in the English manufacturing districts.

Another affair has taken place which will cause the Americans still more to be alienated from Great Britain. As if the threatened war with Japan, the difficulty with Greece, the Tehuantepec trouble with Mexico, the prospect of a third invasion of Cuba, and the violation of the Fishery treaty with Great Britain, was not enough to occupy the attention of the American government, a frigate of war—the 'Raritan'—has been sent to protect the American vessels in their violations of Peruvian laws.

Peru is under the protection of Great Britain. The *Journal of Commerce* says the Peruvian government has been representing to the British government for a number of years that American fishermen have been encroaching on Peru's fishing grounds, and American vessels have been going to the Lobos Islands, and taking guano therefrom without the permission of the Peruvian government. Peru asserts that the Lobos Islands have been appendages of Peru for 280 years; the American government asserts that the Lobos Islands were only discovered 29 years ago, and that by an American sea captain. The present British Ministers have acknowledged the claims of Peru, and informed Peru that Great Britain will not permit any nation to take guano from those Islands unless by Peru's permission, on the strength of which the Peruvian Government has informed the United States Government that if Americans are determined to fish in their waters and take guano from their Islands, it must be at the cannon's mouth. In consequence of this the Raritan has been sent out with all possible haste to enforce the claims of the Americans.—*St. John Times*.

POPISH INTOLERANCE.—The authorities of Naples have recently closed a school established in that city in 1848, by Mr. Hamilton, an English Protestant. After attempting to effect their object by indirect annoyances, and failing, the police suddenly entered the house of Mr. Hamilton, and turned out all the boys by force, some of whom, their parents not being in Naples, were positively in the streets, not knowing where to go. This unjustifiable act was immediately communicated to Sir W. Temple, the British Minister, who has taken immediate steps to protect Mr. Hamilton.—*Bos. Journal*.

THE FISHERY DISPUTE.—The excitement about the codfish waxes hot with Brother Jonathan, even in these dog-days. The way he fumes is positively fearful. But he should recollect that he has not Mexicans to do with this time, and talk softly. We Brits can brag almost as largely as our Yankee cousins, and perfectly understand how much it comes to—so Brother Jonathan may as well keep cool and discuss the codfish leisurely. It is a Colonial business this time, and Jonathan can't humbug the Carluks or the Blue-noses as he did poor fat John Bull in the Eastern boundary and Oregon negotiations. The Colonists know Jonathan thoroughly, and his way of going about things.

It is satisfactory to see our neighbors at last admitting the advantage they have enjoyed for years through the generosity of the British Colonies, and we hope it may lead them to reflections on their own stinginess.—*Toronto Globe*.

RETALIATING UPON GREAT BRITAIN.—On Wednesday the House, on motion of Mr. Evans of Maryland, adopted an amendment to the civil and diplomatic bill, imposing the same lighthouse duties on English vessels entering our ports, which American vessels are compelled to pay in English ports. One leading object suggested by Mr. Evans for this measure was, that it offered means for retaliation upon Great Britain in respect to the late orders for the exclusion of our fishermen from the waters where they have been accustomed to fish.—The lighthouse duties paid by our vessels in British ports amount to \$2,000,000 a-year; Grinnell & Minturn, of New York, have paid \$250,000.—*Boston Post*.

A MELANCHOLY SCHEDULE.—The N. York Herald compiles the loss of life occasioned by the burning, snagging, collisions, and boiler-bursting of steamers in this country since Jan. 1st, 1852, a little more than six months—and the result shows nearly five hundred lives lost and one hundred injured, in twenty accidents. These figures show the necessity of stringent regulations on the subject of steam navigation.

The Hon. Joseph R. Ingersoll, who has been appointed Minister to England in place of Hon. Abbott Lawrence, was formerly a member of Congress from the Philadelphia district. He is a sound Whig, an able and accomplished debater, and a truly national statesman. As a gentleman he is polished, accomplished and well-informed. He will confer honor upon our nation, which he will ably represent.—*Boston Journal*.

On the 2d inst. considerable excitement prevailed at Havana, in consequence of the alleged discovery of a political conspiracy, in which a number of influential persons were said to be engaged. A large number of seditious documents were reported to have been found, and the persons accused of circulating them were arrested.

A monster iron steamship, called the *Atrato*, is now building in one of the English shipyards, which will be large enough to contain the steamship *Arabia* of 2400 tons, and a good deal of room to spare. Her length of keel will be 310 feet, and her promenade, from stem to stern, 330 feet long by about 38 feet broad.

NEW YORK NAVY YARD.—The frigate *Independence* is now undergoing repairs in the Navy Dry Dock. The *Constitution* is fitting out with all possible dispatch, in order, it is said, to be sent to the fishing grounds. Several other vessels, now at the yard, will be put in order immediately, and await advices from Washington.

A torch light procession was attempted by the Scott men in a New York ward, the other evening, when only twenty torches could be raised. A bystander excused this poverty of light by saying that they were saving their oil to find the Whig party with after the election.

The Eastport Sentinel, in speaking of the appearance of the Mississippi in that port, says: She was visited by hundreds of men and women, and many of our women were visited by her men or 'officers,' bright buttons being always at a premium in this place. O fie! Emery.—*Calais Journal*.

UNCOMMON CASE.—Mr. Jonathan Fuller, who died in North Chelsea, Mass., on the 21st inst., at the advanced age of 83, died in the same house in which he was born, and had never slept from under its roof a single night in his life.
