

Grand Jury for the time being, who might not be impressed with the same benevolent and munificent sentiments that actuated the minds of their predecessors. Properly considered, it was a very undignified system; one that, being favorable to designing persons, was open to suspicion, and might be abused,—must ultimately in discontent upon an already over-taxed people—and that however unpleasant the task, a sense of duty impelled them to oppose the allowance. Much more was and might be said upon the *pros* and *cons* of this matter.

The necessity for a presiding mind endowed with the rare accomplishments,—the varied erudition and legal lore of Mr. Justice Wetmore, and gifted, as the especial favorite of nature, with the power of controlling by the mere exercise of his fascinating suavity, the refractory members of his Bench, and restoring its turbulent disputations to harmony by the music of his voice, will be admitted by all persons of taste, discernment and judgment, who have had the good fortune to be spectators at his Court.

But, Sir, whatever may be the importance of these questions, and whichever of these bodies may be in the right, the fact that a difference did arise between them, is of vital importance to the County, and likely to result in the people's taking unto themselves the management of their monetary and parochial affairs. It has been the means of forcing upon them an enquiry into the ostensible purposes for which assessments are made, and a minute investigation into the manner in which the monies arising therefrom are expended.

You, Sir, cannot have failed to perceive, however, that the whole affair was a trial of strength. That it should have arisen between Bodies so composed, and so brought together as these are, can be rendered plain only by digging deep into the dark mysteries and hidden springs of action that characterize human nature. The Grand Jury claimed to be the Representatives of the County; possessed of Legislative and other powers, before which the Justices should bow down. The Justices laid claim to a co-extensive power with the Grand Jury, and also the power to veto measures which they conceived to be illegal or unsound in policy. From this exercise of the veto, the Grand Jury appealed to the people, and laid their grievance before a Public Meeting.

But I must reserve for future chapters, the history and review of this appeal, as well as some remarks upon the working of the present system of County government, and an analysis of the materials composing the Bodies having direction over the affairs therein.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Tuesday, 6th April, 1852.
ORDERED, That the Fortieth Standing Order of this House be for three months previous to the next meeting of the Legislature published in the Royal Gazette, and also in a newspaper in each County in which a newspaper is published.

XL. That no Bill, or Resolution or other Proceeding, founded upon any application addressed to the House of Assembly, be sustained by the Council unless an application to the same effect, with such documents as may accompany the same, be also presented to the Council in General Assembly.

THE following were adopted as Standing Rules in the Session of 1851:—

37th.—That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such County where Newspapers are published.

38th.—That this House will sustain no application for allowances to Teachers of Common or Parish Schools, unless it shall be certified by at least two Trustees of Schools for the Parish where such School has been taught, shewing the time actually taught—the Teacher to be licensed—the cause why such Teacher was not certified to the Sessions in the ordinary way—and that such Teacher was not compelled to discontinue his or her School on account of any improper conduct.
