

We have given a much larger space to the debates in Council this year than to those of the Assembly. We consider the first quite as important and interesting as the latter—we also receive the first direct from the Reporter at an early date, while the latter are several days reaching us. We have however, given those of the greatest interest to the County, and as the "Fredericton Reporter" has promised to publish, at the end of the session, a general summary of the transactions of the House of Assembly, we shall take the liberty of republishing it for the information of our readers. The question of paying Reporters will doubtless soon come up when the old story will be told over again, objections will first be raised, and then a grant passed paying all, indeed it would be unjust not to pay them, as by paying them in former years inducement has been held out that they will be paid this year. Now is the time that arrangements should be made for another year. Let it be understood what the House intends to do, and then Reporters or Publishers will know what they have to depend upon; it is too late after reporters have worked all the session, to say, you shall not receive anything for your services—it should be understood before hand. We go for paying all this year, and making some new arrangement for the next.

By Telegraph from Fredericton to News Room.

Friday, April 8th.—Council passed a joint address on the subject of Reciprocal Free Trade for the Fisheries. Also a bill to negotiate a loan to build a Court House in Fredericton.

Also a Bill relating to the local government of Counties, Towns, and Parishes, referring only to Charlotte County.

Assembly engaged nearly all day in the Election Bill. There is a majority for it.—Progress reported at 6 o'clock.

Saturday, April 9th.—A Bill passed in Council to reduce the Directors in Central Bank. A resolution moved by the Hon. Mr. Gilbert was sustained, for the purpose of introducing machinery for farming apparatus. The Assembly engaged part of the day in Supply. The question on the Election Bill was taken and sustained by a large majority. Committee then reported progress.

Monday, 11th.—In Council, a Bill to build a Lock-up house at the Bend of Petitcodiac passed. Progress made in a Bill to incorporate the Gas Light Company in St. Stephens.

In the Assembly the Orange Bill passed in Committee without discussion 19 to 17. When the Speaker resumed the Chair, moved that the report be accepted. House divided 19 to 19; 2 members having come in the Bill was then lost by the casting vote of the speaker.

Committee in Supply the remainder of the day.

Tuesday, April 9th.—Passed in Council the St. Stephen's Gas Light Company Bill. Also, the St. John City Charter Bill. Also several appropriations.

The Assembly passed a bill relative to the Coast Fisheries, and the prevention of illicit Trade. Also a Bill relating to the support of nightly watch on the Eastern side of St. John. Then in Supply till 5 o'clock.

Wednesday, April 13th.—Both branches engaged nearly all day in Supply. Progress rapidly.

Council passed a bill to facilitate the construction of the St. Andrews & Quebec Railway. His Honor the President informed the Council that he had just received a letter from Mr. Connell, tendering his resignation, which was read by the clerk.

Mr. English late last evening made a long speech in defence of his conduct while a member of the Assembly, and refuting several charges made against him in the *Sentinel*, it being in writing, to give to Mr. Hill for publication.

FREDERICTON, April 12th.—Ice is clear from Glazier's, below Fredericton, to St. John.—Steamer expected to leave St. John for Fredericton to-morrow.

SINGULAR RAIN STORM.—On Friday last here was a rain storm before dawn in Cincin-

nati, and when daylight came the pavements throughout the entire city were found to be strewn with a yellow substance resembling sublimate of Sulphur. Several scientific gentlemen examined it, and pronounced it to be the pollen of flowers which, they suppose, must have been gathered up in large quantities in the far South and born northward by the wind.—Many earth worms were also found on the pavements, supposed to have also fallen with the rain.

We have read frequently of large oxen, sheep, and pigs, raised in this Province, which would do credit to any country, and we may add that of large fowls and eggs. Mr. J. H. Whitlock handed us an egg yesterday, laid by one of his hens, (a Cochon China pullet) which weighs one quarter of a pound, and measures in length 7-8 inches by 6-1-4 in breadth.—[St. Andrews Standard.]

LEGISLATURE.—It is expected that the Provincial Legislature will be prorogued about the first of May. If so, the Session will have occupied about 66 days.

The Legislature of Nova Scotia was prorogued on the 4th instant, after a session of 74 days.
