

**NEW PADDLE WHEELS.**—Dr. E. Pratt professes to have accomplished a desideratum in steam enginery—namely, paddle wheels that have no back water, the advantage of which is a great acquisition of propelling power. The contrivance is simple enough: the introduction of eccentric wheels in the paddle, connecting by rods placed horizontally in grooves at the arms, and a friction roller at each end. In making the revolutions the floats are in turn raised out of the water perpendicularly, under the shaft, and let down again when required for propulsion. In this way back water is done away with, and no difficulty can arise from the clogging of the wheels by the ice or drift wood. A slight alteration in the form of the circles is all that is required to dip the floats in the water at any point that may be required, say an angle of 45 degrees.

**CANADA FAIR.**—The annual Agricultural Fair in Canada is to be held this year at Toronto from the 21st to the 24th of September next. Premiums are to be awarded on the occasion to the amount of \$6,000. Among them will be the annual premium of \$125 for the best bushel of wheat, and \$150 for the best horse sixteen hands high.

**MORE WONDERS.**—Another medium was discovered yesterday morning at the Galt House—a young gentleman, who, by the mere force of his voice, caused a heavy table in the reading room to run about the room with great velocity. #### NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

**I**N pursuance of an order in Council dated the 21st instant, that "all Letters transmitted by Mail containing or purporting to contain Money, shall be registered at the Post Office receiving the same, and a Receipt given therefor, and also a Receipt taken from the party to whom the same may be delivered, on condition of the payment at time of posting such Letters, of six-pence for each Letter, in addition to the Letter Postage chargeable for the same; unless the party requiring the transmission of any such Money Letter decline paying the sum of six-pence for such extra service, in which case, the said Letters shall be transmitted as any other Letters by Post."—Notice is hereby given that the necessary forms will be at once printed and issued to the Postmasters and Way Office Keepers, to enable them to carry the above order into effect from the 6th July next.

Persons desirous of thus Registering letters, must post them thirty minutes before the hours appointed for closing the respective mails, as, to insure greater accuracy in their transmission. Postmasters are authorized to refuse Registering Letters brought to the Post Office at a later hour.

As stated above, the Registration fee and Letter postage, must be paid in advance; this may be done, however, either in money, or in Postage Stamps, or part in money, part in Postage Stamps.

It must be understood, that this Registration will not extend to the United States, nor to any Foreign country. Should it be desired, however, such Letters will be Registered and forwarded as far as possible under the Regulations for the Registration of Letters. Throughout the United Kingdom, and British Provinces, Letters will be treated with the same care as in this Province.
