

CRIME IN NEW YORK.

The report of the Chief of Police for the first half of the present year was transmitted by the Mayor to the Board of Aldermen last evening. From this document it appears that:—

From January 1 to July 1, 1852, there were 6,420 persons taken into custody, for felonies and misdemeanors; of this number 2,694 were offences of a violent nature against the persons, viz:—assault with intent to kill, 87; assault and battery, 2,206; assaulting policemen, 89; fighting in the streets, 236; murder, 12; robbery in the first degree, 43; for similar offences during the previous six months, there were 3,332 persons arrested, showing a decrease of 38.

There were 8,250 persons arrested for disorderly conduct, while there were 9,420 persons arrested for the same offence during the previous six months. The whole number of arrests during the six months ending with 31st of December, 1851, was 18,452, being 2,053 more than were arrested during the period embraced in the report.

There were 2,143 offences reported as having been committed against property, of which 1,111 (more than one half) were petit larcenies. The report says that the daring manner in which robberies are committed almost exceeds belief.

"Cattle are butchered and dressed on farms adjoining the city, and bro't to this market for sale; while droves of sheep are carried away at night from the immediate neighborhood of the farm house without alarming the owner; ships are boarded and robbed of cables, rigging, &c., while the officers are sitting in their bins; the cabins of vessels are entered at night, and the pockets of the sleepers rifled of their contents, and other like offences are of frequent occurrence, as not even to excite surprise when related."

A Negro woman belonging to George M. Harrison, of Polk county, Tenn., killed four of her children by cutting their throats, while they were asleep, on Thursday night the 2nd ult., and then put an end to her own existence by cutting her throat. Her master knows of no use for the horrid act, unless it be that she had him speak of selling her and two of her children, and keeping the others.—*Rich. Times.*

SHIPWRECK AND SAD LOSS OF LIFE.—*Erie, N. Y.*—The barque Rochester, bound from Cleveland to Buffalo, with a cargo of 600 tons for Messrs. Mobie & Champlain, is now ore about seven miles above this place.—lies on her beam ends, and no doubt will be a complete wreck. Her crew, consisting of 15 persons, are also supposed to have been lost, except the captain and one boy. The vessel at last accounts was lashed to the rigging of the U. S. steamer Michigan has left for the relief of distress.

The U. S. steamer Michigan has returned from the wreck of the steamer Rochester—did not find any portion of the vessel, she being gone entirely to pieces. Every soul is believed lost except the captain and a boy.—The vessel was owned by F. W. Myers, of Buffalo, and was insured for \$4500.

REMARKABLE PASSAGE.—The ship *Runney*, built at this port by Messrs. Smith & Co., has made the passage from Liverpool to Australia in the remarkably short run of seventy days, being by three days the shortest on record. This is another proof of what New Brunswick built ships are capable of performing. The R. is now owned by a firm in Liverpool.—*St. John Chronicle.*

LIGHTNING CAUGHT.—*Captivity Captive.*—One of the daguerreotype views of the vicinity of St. Louis, taken by Easterly, artist of the city, is seen a *bona fide* streak of lightning, which was caught in some lucky moment of the day.
