LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Fredericton, Feb. 24, 1853.

This being the day appointed for the meeting of the Legislature, at 2 o'clock His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor came in the usual state to the Council Chamber...

S P E E C H :

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I have much pleasure in informing you that the Railway Bills passed by you at the last session, have received the sanction of the Queen.

Nothing has occurred to change my opinion as to the policy which you have pursued, or to shake my faith in the advantage to be derived from great Public works of this character...

You may deem it expedient in your present session, to consider the general management of the roads throughout the Province...

Your wisdom may possibly devise some amendment in the present law for regulating the election of Members of the Assembly...

The law Commissioners appointed in pursuance of the Act of last year, have labored with much diligence and perseverance...

It has pleased Providence again to bless us with abundant crops, and the commercial situation of the Province is upon the whole satisfactory.

I believe that the Exhibition which took place this last Autumn was calculated to inspire confidence in our own resources...
