THE FISHERY QUESTION .- By reference to the report of the proceedings in the United States Senate yesterday, it will be seen that Mr. Mason of Virginia, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, introduced a resolution of inquiry into the subject of the Fishery troubles on our Northeastern coast. The President was requested to communicate to the Senate all correspondence touching the matter, since the convention of 1818. Information was also requested as to whether any portion of the navy had them in return. Reader, if you feel reproved, been ordered to the North for the protection of the rights of American fishermen. A feeling of indignation against the British Government, for ordering upon the coast an armed fleet, without notice or warning, was very generally expressed in the speeches of the Senators. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

It is stated that the U. S. ship Albany, Charles T. Pratt, Commander, which arrived at this port on Wedensday, will proceed to the disputed fishing grounds as soon as she receives the necessary stores. The Albany carries 22 guns. -Boston Journal.

SINGULAR DEATH OF A BOY .- Thomas Larkin, 13 years of age, while bathing in the river at Windsor Locks, Ct., was heard to utter a cry of pain and sink, with a backward motion, as if drawn under. The boy who was with him and saw him sink, raised an alarm, and Mr. W. B. Turpin, of Springfield who was at work in the vicinity, immediately proceeded to the spot, and dove in after the little fellow. He found him about 20 feet from the spot, where he was seen to sink, lying on the bottom, with his face downward. When taken from the water he was dead and upon examination the fleshy part of his leg appeared to have been bitten, as if by a large fish. Upon one side were seven incisions of the depth of three quarters of an inch, and six upon the other. They were evidently made by the teeth of a fish, and of what kind is a question.—Springfield Post.

AN AMERICAN CAPTAIN MOBBED BY NE-GROES .- Barbadoes dates received to June 23. A case of Lynch Law occurred on the 19th, which had caused considerable excitement. Captain Evans, of schr. Sally Evans, during a scufile of board his vessel, unfortunately killed a negro. ACCIDENTS FROM STEAM .- A report from Mr. Corwin, Secretary of the Treasury, shews, that from the 3rd to the 16th day of August. of all the steamers in the United States, ouetenth part are annually destroyed by fatal accidents. In the year 1851, on the Jakes and rivers there were lost, one hundred and eighteen steamers, and six hundred and ninety five lives!
