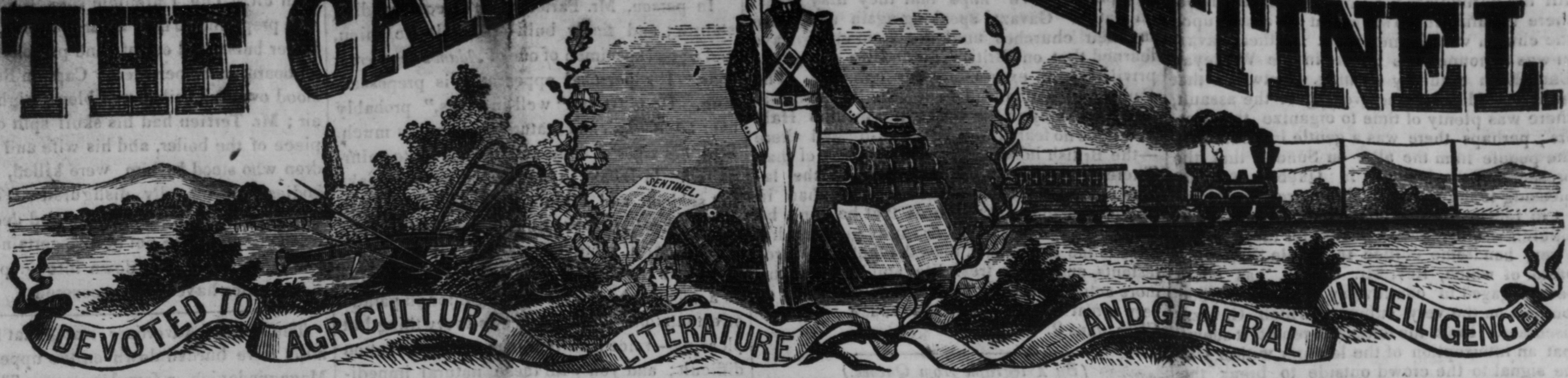

HINT TO FARMERS.—It is greatly to be wished that our farmers were more desirous to possess good, fertile, productive farms, than large farms.—If farmers in our country, instead of increasing the number of their acres, would bestow more care and expense in cultivating, in the best possible manner, every acre they already possess, they would live easier, and become richer and happier also. It has often been remarked, especially by those who have travelled abroad, that the greater fault of our American farmers lies in their eager desire to add field to field, which often impoverishes them, keeps them in debt, and renders them unable to bring any of their lands into the highest and most profitable state of cultivation. The advice of Dean Swift should be treasured up by every good farmer. This distinguished man said—Whoever can make two ears of corn, or two blades of grass grow upon a spot of ground where only one grew before, deserves better of mankind, and does more essential service to his country, than the whole race of politicians put together. *Boston Journal.*

BUTTER.—An essay published in the Transactions of the Rhode Island Society for the encouragement of Domestic Industry, charges much of the miserable butter in the market to the use of impure salt from Liverpool and Onondaga. Good salt can be had at Syracuse, but no small quantity of it is contaminated with Epsom and glauber salts, sulphate of lime, and the chlorides of calcium and magnesia. The best salt for butter is the West India rock salt, washed, dried, and finely pulverized.

THE DESTRUCTION OF POMPEII.—Pompeii was not completely destroyed by a single eruption.—Eight successive layers traced above its ruins. In the intervals, the inhabitants must have returned to secure their most valuable property. Sir William Gell mentions that the skeleton of a Pompeian was found, who apparently for the sake of sixty coins, a small plate and a saucapan of silver, had remained in his house, until the street is already half filled with volcanic matter. The position of the skeleton indicated that he had perished, apparently in the act of escaping from the window.

Other instances of like character are no less striking. The skeletons of Roman sentries were found in more than one instance, at their posts, furnishing a remarkable proof of the stern military discipline of imperial Rome. The skeleton of a priest was found in one of the rooms of the Temple of Isis. Near him lay an axe, with which he had been trying to break through the door.—*Passmore Edwards.*
