

Arrival of the Pacific!

By Telegraph to the Sentinel News Room. New York, June 13.—The Pacific from Liverpool arrived here at 2 o'clock, P. M., yesterday.

She brings 123 passengers. Some appearance exists of the Turkish war shortening supplies.

Money in demand and consols rather depressed by the Turkish news.

Foreign securities down—especially Russian.

The Government refused to say in both Houses of Parliament, whether the Mediterranean fleet had been ordered to assist Turkey.

The English, French, Prussian, and Austrian Ministers made attempts at reconciliation. Menschikoff and the Divan equally inflexible. The former left for Odesa.

The Russian army 100,000 strong were concentrating on the Turkish frontier.

The Ottoman fleet were sent for, and part dispatched to Egypt for troops.

Couriers were sent to every Province, calling out the warlike resources of the Empire.

The whereabouts of the French fleet not known.

The orders to the British fleet were kept a profound secret.

The affair looks critical.

SWITZERLAND has ordered a levy en masse to fight Austria if required.

An interesting discussion had taken place in the House of Lords concerning the Cuban Slave question.

The British fleet off Cuba to be augmented.

The British prospects in Birmah very bad.—They had met with a repulse and suffered severely in the skirmish.

The express steamer was sent to India for more troops.

Advices from China to April 28th.

Nankin was invested by the rebels on the 16th.

The Portugese were hired to assist the city by water, but their boats were taken by the rebels.

The American commander attempted to place the Susquehanna frigate, between Nankin and the rebels, but with what result was not known.

Commander Perry had arrived at Hong Kong, and dispatched the Plymouth to Shanghai immediately.

A private letter one day later, says:—"Nankin has fallen, and the British squadron had refused to permit British merchantmen to convey stores up the river to either party."

The Genoa arrived out on the evening of the 29th, making a 14 days' passage.

The new screw steamer is to leave Liverpool on the 16th inst. for Montreal.

STILL LATER.

Turkey is preparing for war, and will have the entire force of the warlike Albanians on her side. Fleets and armaments are being concentrated but nothing is said of Menschikoff's movements.

Parliamentary news uninteresting.

Russia is now demanding of the Shah of Persia, instant payment of a large loan or ceding of the Province of Asteraba, the Shah refuses either.

A naval engagement occurred at Buenos Ayres, the Urquiza capturing two vessels; the other Admiral ran away.

SAD SUICIDE.—Olinda Donane, a young woman of Harwich, in this State, committed suicide on the 23d ult., under the most touching and distressing circumstances. She was a very respectable woman, and had been but a few weeks married. The circumstances of her death we find related in an exchange, as follows:

For a year or so previous to her marriage, she had received visits from a respectable young man by the name of Hall, to whom she engaged to be married. Her parents opposed her choice, and favored the suit of a widower of considerable property, named Doane. Hall soon after married another, when the parents of the deceased prevailed on her to marry Doane. The friends were invited, but before the time for the ceremonies to commence, the young lady excused herself and retired.

Not returning her sister went to her room, saw blood on the mirror and on the floor, went to the bed, and turning down the clothes found her sister with her throat cut and her bridle robes saturated with blood. Assistance was called, her wound dressed, and she recovered.

Soon after she was married since which time she has been occasionally deranged. She fainted in church a few Sabbaths since, on seeing Hall and his wife enter; and last Monday week, at 2 o'clock P. M., while the god of day animated all nature with his refulgence, she stole from the authors and scene of her ruin, to close this tale of suffering and wrong.—Springfield Rep.
