

## ENGLISH NEWS.

## Arrival of the Niagara.

By Telegraph to the Sentinel News Room.

HALIFAX, March 30, 1853.—Niagara from Liverpool, Saturday 19th, 2 P. M., arrived at Halifax 5 P. M. Struck on entrance of Halifax harbor in a fog.

BRITAIN.—Parliamentary business important. Mr. Mills drew attention of Government to the fact, that the only winter route of British troops to Canada is through the territory of the United States, and asked if Government intended to facilitate, by guarantee or otherwise, the completion of the Halifax and Quebec Railroad. Mr. Paul, for Government, was unable to state.

Lord John Russell spoke of Austrian proceedings towards Sardinia, in consequence of the Milan insurrection. Sardinia had requested the British Government to interfere against sequestration. Britain had written a strong letter to Vienna, but in the mean time Austrian authorities had stated their intention to remove sequestration from parties proving themselves innocent. Lord John Russell also stated that Government had received notice that the Grand Duke had liberated the Maidai family and allowed them to leave Tuscany.

Canada Reserves slowly proceeds through Committee—third reading of Bill adjourned till April 11th. Petitions against Maynooth Grant and against interference of Canada Reserves, presented. Estimated imports of Gold next three weeks, £2,000,000 stg. British ship *Bernice* burned in Straits of Gaspar by mutineers—Japanese and Manilla men—Captain and Officers murdered.

FRANCE.—Great anxiety manifested for the Pope's visit to Paris. It is likely, but not certain, that he will come. On *dit*, that the Emperor of Austria insists upon the Pope coming to Vienna to perform the coronation ceremony; but to this Napoleon will not assent. It is very doubtful if Napoleon will concede anything in spiritual affairs if he does come.

The Paris Exhibition will open on the 1st of May, 1855.

SWITZERLAND.—Old Switzer spirit seems roused against Austria. It is reported that Austria, without occupying Ticino, will maintain the blockade indefinitely, but no answer has yet been given to the note of the Federal Council. Private accounts tell sad stories of sufferings of banished Ticanese—women and children perished by the way.

Austrian Government extremely dissatisfied with recent statements in British Parliament, that England would not expel refugees—thinks it would be no use to prosecute Mazini or Kosuth in English Courts, as no jury would find them guilty.

Haynau is dead—no particulars given.

TURKEY.—Montschioff's—Russian—ultimatum is repelled by Divan, Sultan invokes assistance from France and England. The British fleet is ordered from Malta to the Archipelago.

THE HONDURAS AFFAIR.—Boston 17th.—An important cabinet meeting was held Tuesday. It resulted it is said in directing the Secretary of State to demand an explanation from the government of Great Britain on the subject of the recent intelligence from Honduras. The Secretary of the Navy was also instructed to report forthwith to the executive the force at his disposal for active operation.

ADVENTUROUS BOYS.—On last Saturday, there passed through Galena, by stage, two boys, one of four and the other seven years of age. They left the County of Clare, Ireland, the 1st of January, for Dubuque, and came the whole way unattended by relatives or particular friends. When they left New York on their journey westward, they had but \$2.50 with which to pay their expenses, but when they arrived at Chicago, the sum had grown to \$6. Weakness and confiding strength are ever a surer protection than strength. Whatever may be the defects in the American character, at the present time, a want of sympathy is not one of them.—*Galena Gazette*.
