#### DIMENSIONS OF FURROW.

Depth from 5 to 7 inches. Width from 8 to 12 inches. One-eighth of an acre to be ploughed by each competitor.

#### Rules for the Guidance of Competitors.

No person shall be allowed to compete unless he becomes a Member and pays in his Subscription of Five Shillings or upwards, on or before Tuesday the 21st September, and in no case will a member be allowed to offer, as his own, the property of another.

All Grain, Root Crops and Manufactures entered for competition must be the productions of this County, the present year; and all Stock so entered must have been raised in this County, (Stallions, Bulls, Boars and Rams excepted, and which must have been owned by the Competitors, not less than one year prior to the day of Exhibition.)

No Competitor will be allowed to exhibit any animal in a two-fold capacity, nor receive more than one premium upon Samples of Grain, or other articles of the same kind or class.

No animal that has taken a premium at any previous Show of this Society will be allowed to compete again in the same character.

Persons competing for Root Crops grown upon a given quantity of land, must exhibit a sample of one bushel at the Show, and an affidavit by himself and another credible person of the quantity must also be furnished the Secretary on that day, or as soon thereafter as the quantity can be ascertained.

Articles for Exhibition must be entered with the Secretary not later than the Thursday next previous to the day of the Show, who will present each Competitor with a numbered Card corresponding to the entry in his book, which must be attached to the article exhibited, and the premiums will be awarded to the respective numbers.

Cattle Pens and other arrangements suitable

for the purpose will be prepared previous to the day of Exhibition, and halters or ropes must be furnished by the Owners of Horses and Neat Stock, that they may be securely tied: a Committee will be present to assign their respective positions, as well as other articles for competition, wherein they must be placed by the parties in charge, and remain until the close of the exhibition. Stock must be on the ground by nine o'clock, A. M.

Competitors will not be allowed the custody of any article exhibited, after being placed in the position assigned it by the Committee, until the close of the Exhibition, nor be present, or to interfere in any way with the Judges while occupied with their examinations. Any violation of this rule will exclude the owner of such articles from receiving the premiums.

Competent and impartial Judges will be selected, who will commence their examination at 10 1-2 o'clock, and their decision will be final. The Judges will be at liberty to withhold any premium, if they consider the animal or article offered deficient in merit.

Special premiums will be awarded upon any articles not provided for in the above list, if such are offered as the Judges shall consider worthy of encouragement. This will apply to Flax, which was overlooked by the Directors.

Hay will be furnished by the Society for Stock exhibited for Premiums, and owned by Members residing at such a distance as to render it inconvenient to drive in the same on the morning of the Show.

Further regulations for the government of the Show on the day of Exhibition, as the law provides, will be published in due time.

### THE STOCKPORT RIOTS.

The Stockport riots case has been heard and adjudged. The result has proved—not as the Popish journals here and abroad have industriously circulated, that the affair was the first act of a murderous drama deliberately concocted by Lord Derby and his Government—but that the sanguinary proceedings resulted from the premeditated aggression of the Irish, who proclaimed themselves masters of Stockport, and would have been glad to have proved themselves so. The English were goaded into opposition, and when excited they, doubtless, went further than the necessity of the occasion required. The lesson they gave to their opponents will be a salutary one. The judge's comments were made in a severely impartial spirit. They will, however, otherwise received, meet with universal acquiescence on one point. We allude to the reference made to the ringleaders who have not yet been secured. If by these are meant the cowardly and concealed suggesters of the proceedings, we agree with the judge in hoping that further enquiry is necessary.—We believe that the instigators will be found among the men who are constantly urging on the Papists of this country to come into collision whenever they can do so with promise of success, with the Protestants. The Popish journals of France repeat this advice to their priestly readers in England and Ireland; and such of the latter who are ill-disposed repeat this advice from alters that should be alters of peace. It would, indeed, be desirable to bring such instigators of evil to condign punishment; but the difficulties of proof afford them all the panoply of impunity. We who read, watch, and do not forget, are convinced that the spirit first let loose by the Irish at Stockport has been excited in this country by priestly agents who travel about affecting peace, but meaning war. Let those learn to draw wise conclusions from the turn given to the fray by the Stalwart Saxons of Stockport. Such men are, in reality, the most peacefully inclined of our laboring classes.—Unparoled insult renders them the most pug-
