

ENGLISH NEWS.

Arrival of the Europa.

By Telegraph to the Sentinel News Room.

The steamship *Europa*, with Liverpool dates to 28th ult., has arrived at New York.

The Cotton Market was the same as last quoted. The Corn and Flour Market was also unchanged.

The potato disease was apparently stopped and the tidings of harvest operations from all quarters were good.

Mr. Webster's views regarding the Lobos Islands are very unsatisfactory in England. Although some bad weather had occurred, crops are expected to be very abundant.

The political and general news from England is without interest. There is nothing from France worth reporting.

Cardinal Wiseman is leading the French people to miraculous pictures, statues, and other mummery.

The town of Wasa, in Sweden, has been utterly destroyed by fire.

STILL LATER.

The Pacific from Liverpool arrived at New York Saturday evening. Trade reports are very satisfactory—Consols closed on 7th. Dublin, 6th Sept. There is no variation in the tone of last agricultural reports; the yield generally is said everywhere to be on an average.

The Africa arrived the 11th—news not important. The war-steamers *Gesler* was fitting out for the North American station. The Kaffirs are becoming disciplined and moving with true military precision.

La Minerve says that a distinguished native form British India, has arrived at Donegan's Hotel, in the city of Montreal, and adds that he has come on a mission from the East India Company to visit the American ship-building establishments. His costume is fanciful as well as his head-dress. He speaks English well, and is on his way to Quebec to see the Governor-General.—*Toronto Globe*.

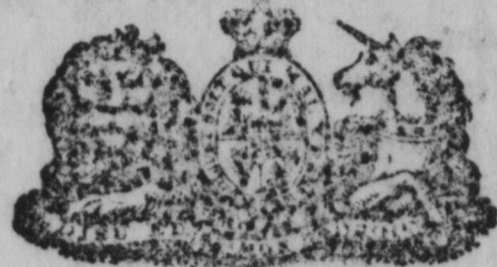

PARISH SCHOOLS.

TEACHERS of Schools in the County of Carleton are hereby notified that the Local Inspector will meet them at the School House, Butter milk Creek, near Appleby's, on Monday the 27th inst., at 11 o'clock A.M., and Woodstock, Mechanics' Institute, on Thursday the 30th inst., same hour, in order to the signing their Certificates, and countersigning their Returns and Registers, so as to secure their transmission to the Chief Superintendent at the proper time.

It is expected that Teachers will be prepared to exhibit their Licence Agreement with the Proprietors, and a Memorandum from the Trustees, declaratory of their consent and approbation, together with any other documents that may be thought advisable.

It is absolutely necessary that Teachers attend at either one or the other of the places above mentioned, at the times appointed, in order to carry out the orders of the Honorable the Provincial Board of Education, as copied below.

* * The next Term of the Training School, in Saint John, will begin on the 25th of October, in the present year; and other two Terms, on the 17th of January and the 11th of April 1853.

MAY 27TH, 1852.

I. "That the classing of Teachers by the Board, at least once in every six months, under Sec 9, take place every three months, viz. during the first week in the months of June, September, December and March; provided that Third

Class Licences granted on Certificates of Local Inspectors be issued at any convenient time, under the direction of the Board, and that all Pupil Teachers who have passed through the Training School, may receive, after favorable report of the Examiners and Certificate of the Training Master, as provided in the Act, a temporary Licence, pursuant to Sec 11, until, at the periods above specified, they be classed, pursuant to Sec 9."

II. "That, pursuant to Sec 12, the School Books sanctioned by the Board be those published by direction of the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland, with such additions as may, from time to time, be approved by the Board; and that the following be forthwith approved:—

Lennie's English Grammar;
Pinnock's Catechism of History of England;
Do. do. History of America."

III. "That the School Registers and Returns to be shown by Teachers to Inspectors, countersigned by Inspectors, returned to Teachers, and transmitted by them to Superintendent, be so transmitted on or before the 30th day of September 1852, the 31st of March 1853, and so on, every six months. (See Sec. 19)"

JUNE 12TH

IV. "That Third Class Licenses be granted for Parishes only, and be transferable, if signed to that effect, by a County Inspector; and that First and Second Class Licenses be granted for Counties, and be transferable if signed by a County Inspector and the Chief Superintendent."

JULY 9TH.

V. "That the Superintendent receive authority for himself and County Inspectors to construe the term "six months," used in Sec. 19 of the School Act and in the accompanying Form of Certificate of County Inspectors, as applying to the close of the month of September; and to instruct Teachers to return and Inspectors to certify for not less than three months, ending on the 30th of September next.

"Also that the Superintendent, Inspectors and Trustees of Schools be authorized to construe the term "School House," in Sec. 3 and 19, as signifying a School Room, when no other provision could, in their judgment, have been made."

VI. "That the Superintendent be directed to inform Inspector—that if the Candidate referred to in his communication dated ——— be adequately certified as competent to teach in the French language, the branches required by law, and be, as the law also requires, of good moral character, he is a proper applicant for a School Licence; but that it will be well for him to endeavor to improve himself in English, with a view to the tuition of such English children as may reside in his neighborhood."

AUGUST 24TH.

VII. "That the Superintendent be directed to instruct County Inspectors that all Licensed but Unclassed Teachers are to be considered as of the standing of Third Class Teachers."

VIII. "That Second or Third Class Teachers who have passed through the Training School, and who aspire to a higher class than that already assigned them by the Board, may be re-examined by the appointed Examiners at any regular period, in order to their being classed anew."

IX. "That as several Teachers began teaching, before the passing of the present School Act under the impression that, on obtaining Licence, they might draw the Provincial allowance from the date of their beginning to teach; County Inspectors be therefore authorized to countersign the Returns of such licensed Teachers for the time they have actually taught, up to the 30th of September next; but that, after that date, no Teacher can be considered as in the Parish School Service unless licensed by the Board of Education, according to law."

X. "That the Superintendent be authorized to call upon County Inspectors for a Quarterly Return of the actual number of their visits of inspection, in order to their receiving quarterly, the minimum amount of remuneration allowed them by law."

XI. "That the following work recommended by Dr. Meilleur, Superintendent of Education for Canada East, receive the sanction of the Board, in order to the instruction of the French population of this Province:—

"Guide de L'Instituteur."

This Horse combines the speediest and stoutest blood as will be seen from his Pedigree, and took the first premium (£200) awarded by the Legislature of the Province in 1847. He is 11 years old, perfectly sound, stands 16 hands high, and weighs 1080 pounds. His stock, ranging in age from Colts of the present season to those rising four, are large and decidedly superior.

JOHN O'GAUNT was got by Rockingham out of Purity; Rockingham by Humphrey Clinker out of Medora by Swordsman; grand dam by Trumpeter, out of Medora by Swordsman; grand dam by Trumpeter, out of Peppermint, sister to Prunella, by Highflyer; Purity by Philo de Puta, winner of the St. Ledger in 1815, out of Rachael Ruysch, sister to Claude Lorraine by Rubens; grand dam by Cesario, Miss Holt by Buzzard. Rockingham won the Shorts at York, the Great St. Ledger, and the Cup at Doncaster; the Goodwood Cup in 1815; the Brighton Cup three years in succession; and six King's Plates—beating all the best Horses of the day. Purity never started but twice winning both her races. JOHN O'GAUNT walked over for the Two-years-old Stakes at Lichfield, and was beat by a head by Henri Quatri, the fastest horse of his day; fifteen started.
