Arrival of the America.

By Telegraph to the Sentinel News Room.

St. John, Sept. 1.

The ministerial journals state that the Fishery dispute is settled on terms of absolute reciprocity, so far as the rights of fishing is considered—Americans to be at liberty to fish in all the British waters, and the British in all American waters—subject on both sides to the restrictions of three miles from the nearest land, without distinction of bay or open sea.

The harvest is proceeding favorably in both England and Scotland. Accounts respecting the potato crop in Ireland are satisfactory, the least favorable estimate that in the affected districts, at least one-half the crop will be saved.

Sir Edmund Head, Lady and two children, and the Bishop of Fredericton, are passengers by the America.

More gold has arrived from Australia—the sum now amounts to about twenty millions within the last twelve months.

G. P. R. James is appointed British Consul at Norfolk, Virginia.

The Princess Vasa and her mother have gone to Austria for the winter, and her marriage with Louis Napoleon supposed to be broken off.

The America and the Mosquito yachts are entered for prizes on both days of the Plymouth regatta—to-day and to-morrow, Thursday. It is not generally known that the Mosquito, now the property of Lonsborough, was built in about three weeks, by Mr. Mate, M. P., for Plymouth, the gentleman who sent a challenge to the New York Club to build a yacht against them for 1000 guineas. The cautious and laconic reply to this challenge, it will be remembered was to the effect, that there was already an American built yacht in British waters, and when she had been beaten by an English vessel, it would be time enough to take the challenge.—*London Chronicle, August 3.*

An insurrection which has broken out in Mexico headed by Ribillido, is carrying everything before it. The Government as yet is unable to make any headway against the malcontents. The Indians were also committing horrible depredations in Zacatecas; government officers are starving to death at Durango, in consequence of not being able to collect their salaries; assassins were overrunning the city of Mexico itself, and the general state of affairs throughout the whole country was deplorable in the extreme. The miseries of Mexico appear to become daily worse.

Rules for the Guidance of Competitors.

No person will be allowed to compete unless a member who has paid his subscription previous to the 1st instant; nor will any person be allowed to offer as his own the property of another.

All Grain, Root Crops, and Manufactures must be the productions of this County the present year, and all articles intended for competition must be entered with the Secretary at least one week prior to the day of exhibition, who will present each competitor with a numbered card, corresponding with the entry in his book, which must be attached to the article, and the premiums will be awarded to the respective numbers.

Cattle Pens and other arrangements for the safe keeping of Stock will be provided previous to the time of the Exhibition, and halters must be furnished by the owners of horses or neat cattle, in order that they may be securely tied. A committee will be in attendance to arrange their position, as well as the other articles offered for competition, where they must remain until the close of the Exhibition. Stock must be on the ground by half-past nine o'clock, A. M.

Persons competing for Root Crops must exhibit a sample of one bushel, and the quantity raised on 1-4 acre must on that day be certified by himself and another credible person, or as soon thereafter as the quantity can be ascertained.

Competent judges will be appointed, who will commence their examinations at 10 o'clock, whose decisions will be final, and who will be instructed not to award a premium where the animal or article is deficient in merit.

Premiums may be awarded on articles not enumerated in the foregoing list, should any be offered that are deemed worthy of encouragement.

No animal or article that has been exhibited at any previous Cattle Show the present year will be allowed to compete, and no animal that has taken a premium at any former show will be allowed to compete again in the same character.

No competitor will be allowed to exhibit any animal in a two-fold capacity, nor receive more than one premium upon samples of grain or other articles of the same kind or class.
