The Union will be protective in political economy, and will advocate many measures of practical reform, to the utmost of the Editor's ability; at the same time it will oppose such innovations as he may consider injurious to the country. But the old party names of Tory, Conservative, Liberal, Radical, &c., which have of late years been put on and off so often by unprincipled men, to suit their own selfish purposes, will be utterly disregarded.

It will be kept free from government, and every other improper influence, and will comment freely upon the conduct of public men, without regard to persons or politics. It shall expose and denounce with unsparring hand the selfishness, corruption, and peculation now prevailing in the three branches of the government, and prove a scourge to all evil-doers.

One of its chief objects will be to effect a union of the British North American Colonies, the Publisher believing such union absolutely necessary, not only for the preservation of our liberties, and to prevent the spread of annexation principles, but to secure the benefits of home commerce, and protect the industry of our artisans, agriculturists, mechanics, and other operatives.

While it will oppose priestcraft and superstition on the one hand, and fanaticism on the other, it will advocate equal religious and political rights and privileges for all classes of Her Majesty's subjects who obey the laws of the land.

The Union will be a staunch and unwavering supporter of that Great and Glorious Union of Protestants known as "THE LOYAL ORANGE ASSOCIATION;" it will strenuously urge the necessity of renewed energy among the members, the extension of the order, and a closer and more effective political union. If there be any lukewarm Protestants who object to this union, on the ground that it is unnecessary, let them reflect upon the incidents enumerated below, which have all occurred within the last eighteen months.

In Rome the Inquisition has been re-established in all its barbarism, while the Protestant Chapel attached to the American Embassy has been closed by the Vatican, and no Protestant is now allowed to worship God in his own way within the walls of the city.

In Tuscany the Medici, and others, were thrust into loathsome dungeons for reading the Protestant Bible. In Spain a Royal Decree was issued, ordering every foreigner travelling in that country, and not professing the Roman Catholic religion, to be arrested and thrown into prison.

In France the Jesuits have been restored to power, and Protestants have been subjected to renewed persecution.

In Ireland, at the late general election, the priests in several instances threatened excommunication to such of their flocks as dared support a conservative candidate. In one instance they led an infuriated mob to attack an unoffending body of troops, and when the troops fired in self defence they attempted to swear their lives away. The election committee of the House of Commons, recently, in declaring the Clare election null and void, denounced this pair of "Reverend Fathers"—Messrs Burke and Clune—by name; they also denounced priestly interference in the Stigo election, which is also declared void.

In England the Romish clergy assumed titles to which they had no right, thereby incurring a penalty; but they set the law at defiance. And in the House of Commons they had the influence to defeat a motion for throwing open the hameries to government inspection, in the event of any complaint being made by the inmates.

In Quebec a Roman Catholic mob attacked a lecturer in a Protestant church, while a Roman Catholic Police stood passively looking on.

In Montreal a Roman Catholic mob, having attacked a Protestant church in order to get at the same lecturer, a Roman Catholic Mayor suffered the rioters to escape, and ordered a detachment of troops to fire upon the inoffensive congregation, as they emerged from the church, thereby killing eleven persons and wounding about twenty others!

What a record of Papistical bigotry and persecution during the last eighteen months! It but proves (what every rational person must admit) that a church professedly governed by her Councils with the cruel and bloody decrees or the Council of Trent still extant—a church believing that all out of its pale must be damned, and that coercion is charity!—can never be tolerant, and that union among Protestants is necessary for self-protection.

To those who wish to see the conduct of our public men faithfully watched, and their misdeeds annulled with due severity—to all who cherish dearly as their lives the great principles of Protestantism, and to the members of the Loyal Orange Association in particular, the Publisher looks with confidence for a generous support.
