

A man by the name of Wingo was summarily executed by the populace of Richmond, Mobile, recently, for the murder of a very estimable citizen named Allen. Wingo was lodged in jail, and when he was brought out for trial, the Court, in consequence of the universal prejudice against the culprit, granted a change of venue, but the populace anticipating the event, and predetermined he should not escape, assembled a mass in front of the court-house, and as soon as the prisoner, in custody of the sheriff, made his egress, a rope was thrown about his neck, and in spite of the remonstrance and efforts of the officers, he was hastily dragged off with such violence as nearly deprived him of life ere he reached the place of execution, a rope was thrown over the branch of a tree, and the prisoner swung by the neck.

The Fishery Treaty.—"Inspector," the Washington correspondent of the Courier & Enquirer, says the report of an entire failure of the negotiations upon the fishery subject is incorrect, inasmuch as a treaty was concluded between Mr. Crampton and Secretary Marcy, and sent to London towards the close of the last month, but it is said that the provisions of the treaty are much in opposition to the views of the British Colonies, particularly in regard to the registry of their vessels and the participation in the coasting trade of the United States.

Great sympathy continues to be manifested by the Public of Paris for the Turks and the Government—by allowing the vendors of the newspapers to announce with a loud voice: "Defeat of the Russians; victory of the Turks!" which is contrary to the police regulations—are believed to encourage and support it.

Much agitation prevails in Naples. The King is afraid that France will reinforce the corps of the army in Rome. The presence of a few French ships of war, he fears, might be a signal for revolution throughout the kingdom.

The commissioners engaged under the mediation of England and Russia in marking the boundary lines between Persia and Turkey, have recently come upon the remains of the ancient palace of Shushan, mentioned in the book of Esther and Daniel, together with the tomb of Daniel, the prophet. The locality, the pavements, the marble columns, &c, answer to the descriptions in Holy Writ.

Charles Kornis and Louis Torok, in New York, have issued a circular, as they say by the direction of Kossuth, in which they enjoin it upon all true Hungarians to take up arms for Turkey.

The Vienna journals announce that a firm of California has sent home to that city some seeds of soap plant. It grows wild in California, rising to the height of about a foot. The plant fades away in the month of May, and inside each is a ball of natural soap, superior, it is assured, to any that can be manufactured.

ARRIVAL OF KOZSTA.—The clipper bark Sultana, Capt. Watson, arrived at Boston on Tuesday night, having made the shortest passage of the season from Smyrna, occupying about 44 days. Martin Kozsta, the Hungarian who was rescued from the clutches of the Austrian officials through the firmness and promptitude of Capt. Ingraham, is a passenger by the Sultana.
