Communications.

To the Editor of the Carleton Sentinel.

TOBIQUE RIVER, May 6th, 1854. SIR :- Having some coruscations floating in my brain, I wish if I can reduce them io a palpable form, to bequeath them as a legacy to the public, in the hope that they may be of some

benefit to society. Man is a social being and has duties to perform to Society as well as to himself. In order to perform these duties aright, he must be educated. It is the duty of every man to take an interest in public affairs, and not to remain neutral on questions of importance to the well-being of the State; for we all exert an influence for good or evil. It is an acknowledged axiom that union is strength, therefore it is our duty when practicable to unite in Society, to erect bulwarks to stem the tide of corruption, and to encourage and promote all that can tend to exalt and adorn humanity. Labour is the universal agent in producing wealth; but intelligence and virtue are required to direct this. wealth in its proper channel so as to be of real value either to the possessor or to society. Wealth. gives its owner power for good or evil. It may be the means of accomplishing great good. It should ever be regarded as a means and not as an end. We are only stewards of what we possess; "The Earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof," and of Timber Berths for the ensuing season, will take to Him we shall have to give an account of our stewardship.

It ought to be remembered that money is power.

Money must always be the sinews of war, and he

who directs its energies strikes a more decided

blow than he who wields the glittering falchion, or points the life destroying tube. Money must be the sinews of everything, and no great or noble enterprise can be carried on without this powerful agent. The lamp of life could not be sent to the perishing heathen; Bibles could not be printed, nor ships to carry them built without the use of money. But how is this power perverted! What millions are squandered in what is worse than useless, in what injures the body, destroys the. intellect, and endangers the soul; and this is done at in our own favored land! It is done on the Sabbath day in the County of Victoria! (I could mention names, but I forbear to do so in the hope that it will be discontinued.) I have wholly abandoned the evil and wish others to follow my example. Here is an opportunity for law-makers to prevent a monstrous evil. Here is an opportunity for ele c. tors to exert their influence aright by voting at the ensuing election for none but Temperance men, and such as will support a prohibitory liquor law. Education is the birth-right of man. It is the duty of Government to do what lies in its power to. ensure its blessings to all her subjects. I am convinced that education will never become universal in this country, until general taxation for schools be adopted as the law of the Province. In this County the people appear to be ready for it, and I think the sooner it is adopted the better.
