GENTLEMEN AND FELLOW COUNTRYMEN,—

At the urgent solicitations of several Freeholders I have been induced to allow myself to be nominated as a Candidate for your suffrages at the approaching Election.

I have considered it neither necessary nor expedient to trespass on your time by visiting you personally at this busy season of the year when time is so very valuable to you as well as myself, and when it could be spent so much more profitably than in listening to such subjects as I might consider necessary to explain. In addition to which I might state that the course usually pursued by Candidates of begging for the suffrages of a constituency from door to door is wholly incompatible with my views. It seems to be the opinion of many that the whole system of electing representatives should be changed and that in lieu of candidates being compelled to travel through the length and breadth of the County very frequently regardless of the sanctity of the sabbath in order to secure their return, men of integrity, independence of sentiment, moral worth, and liberal views, and an unflinching desire to legislate on the broad and universal principle of fair play and equal rights to all, should be elected without so much personal solicitation. Many consider that a purely party man cannot advocate liberal principles and measures, he must carry out the views and sentiments of his party be they what they may—or prove himself retrograde to the principles upon which he was elected.

I have for several years resided in the County and have had occasion to visit some of the back settlements in the neighborhood of my residence and having contrasted the state of the Roads Bridges School Houses &c, with the thousands of pounds squandered, wasted, thrown away upon one foolish scheme and another by the late and former Houses of Assembly, have felt grieved that some portion of such sum had not been applied toward ameliorating the condition of the different settlements in the Province. Should I obtain sufficient support to be returned as one of your representatives, I will previous to the sitting of the house visit every parish in the County in order to see the state of each locality as well as to obtain your views on such subjects as you consider should engage the attention of a Legislature.

In conclusion Gentlemen and fellow countrymen I beg to inform you that I have neither money, vain promises nor any other commodity to spend in order to secure my return, I have merely placed my services at your command, and if you choose to elect me upon such terms I will use my best exertions to give you satisfaction.
