

Hon Mr. Partelow considered the Hon. Member from Carleton right in his objections, and thought that an entirely new Bill ought to be brought in as the present one, if passed, would be of a general character.

Mr Johnston took a similar view with the Hon Member from Carleton (Mr. Connell) and the Hon Mr. Partelow.

Hon Mr. Connell, would oppose the Bill in every form unless the clauses were introduced as recommended by him. He would move that the Chairman leave the chair and report Progress.

Mr. English said that no such Bill as the one now before the committee was required in Carleton at all and should second the motion made by his Hon Colleague the motion being put was carried without opposition.

The Members of Carleton seem to progress admirably, in their duties this year and strict harmony prevails between them. They both took an active part in the debate in answer to his Excellency's speech. Hon Mr. Connell made some two or three excellent and constitutional speeches on the subject, and contended in a statesman like manner for the interest of the Province.

FATAL CASUALTY.—On Monday last, while three lads were amusing themselves coasting down hill on a hand-sled at Kingston, King's County, an ox which was by the roadside became frightened, and in leaping over the sled, one of his feet struck John Walker, the hindmost boy, on the side of the head, causing his death in about an hour. The deceased was about twelve years of age, son of Mr. Henry Walker.—Courier.

NEW BRUNSWICK. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
