

RUSSIAN FRIGATES IN THE PACIFIC.—The London Times says that on the 15th of March the Russian frigate Diana, of 52 guns, was in Valparaiso harbor, and the Aurora, of the same flag, was daily expected. Some fears had been expressed that these vessels would make a roving tour of the Pacific and China Seas, and do damage to British commerce.

By the private advices received in this City, we learn that the Diana sailed from Valparaiso on the 23d March, for the Sandwich Islands. The British frigate President, 50 guns, sailed from Valparaiso on the 21st of March, for Callao and Arica, and the French frigate Forte, 50 guns, sailed on the 23d, for Callao.

Leonard Houslet shot himself dead at Hamelton, near Cincinnati, in his rage, because the moulds in which he was running candles leaked! His wife was present, but was petrified by the man's horrible curses.

At Shumla, there has been, or there will shortly be a military execution, remarkable for the high position of the criminal. Osman Pacha, a Tartar Turk and old soldier, who lately commanded at Matchin, has, by the order of Omar Pacha, been arrested for cowardice in the face of the enemy, and for treasonable connivance with the enemy's plans.

He has, in the face of the troops he commanded, been deprived not only of the insignia of his rank, but also of the outward marks which distinguish the Ottoman soldier. After having been degraded and expelled the army, he has been taken to Shumla. His execution was delayed by Omar Pacha sending a courier to the Porte to obtain the Sultan's assent to the execution of so great a criminal.

His Highness, I understand, saw no reason to interfere with Omar Pacha's jurisdiction, and a Lieutenant Colonel left a few days ago for Shumla bearing the despatch which seals the doom of Osman Pacha.

The Brussels Independence, of the 30th ult., has heard by telegraph from Marseilles, that a portion of the loan for 20,000,000 francs had been advanced to the Porte by the French and English Governments.

The Governor of Matchin has been arrested, and is to be tried by a council of war on a charge of high treason. Letters to him from General Luders are said to have been seized.

THE FRESHET in the River St. John is the greatest and most disastrous of any within the memory of the oldest inhabitant. All the low lands along the banks are submerged, and barns, cattle, lumber, &c., have been swept away. At Canning and some other settlements, the inhabitants have been compelled to leave their houses and remove to the high lands, in order to avoid the danger of being drowned. At Indian Town the water is several inches higher than it was ever before known, and the rain which has fallen for the past few days is causing it rapidly to advance. As there is yet considerable snow in the woods, it is feared that if more rain should fall, the result will be still more disastrous. Our harbour continues more or less full of logs and drift stuff, swept down from the upper country.

From other quarters, we learn that the rivers and streams are much swollen in consequence of the melting snow, and it is said that the bridge over Hammond River has been swept away.—*New Bkr.*

THE MURDER CASE.—Yesterday afternoon the Coroner's Jury returned a verdict of "Wilful Murder" against Reynolds, for having caused the death of Samuel Fanjoy. The prisoner will be tried at the next sitting of the Supreme Court, which, owing to the recent Legislative enactment, will not meet until November.—*Ibid.*

A PHYSICIAN AFLOAT.—A Physician in one of the submerged towns on the Connecticut, writes that he visited his patients in a boat, getting in at the chamber window and tying his boat at the bedpost.—*Portland Transcript.*

Mitchell, the pet of the New York Times, is handled without gloves by his quondam friend C. G. Duffy, of Dublin. This gentleman has written a letter to Mitchell, which was published in the New York papers, and occupies four columns of their space. It gives a review of Mitchell's public life, and completely uses him up. All his faults and follies are prominently brought and dwelt upon with great bitterness. He is described as an empty headed, deceitful, cowardly poltroon, which is very likely to be the case.

FOOL HARDY.—A man in New Orleans, has won \$1000 by shooting an orange from the head of his friend, at a distance of 36 feet.—*Portland Transcript.*

Last week, according to the annual custom, the Archbishop of Paris exposed to public view, on an altar arranged for the purpose at the entrance of the choir, certain relics, a piece of the true cross, three nails, and the crown of thorns.

A new washing machine has been made at Birmingham, which is said to be capable of washing 2000 shirts in ten hours.

At the anniversary dinner of the Royal Humane Society it was stated that, since the origin, it had been the means of saving 30,000 lives.

Mr. Holford, the rich merchant, who had long resided in the Regent's Park, died on the 9th of April, and has left his large fortune to the Prince of Wales.

The Greeks in Manchester are said to have subscribed £10,000 towards supporting the insurrection in Turkey. Those in London and Liverpool are also said to have raised funds.

A CAPITAL SUGGESTION.—The Long Point (C. W.) Reformer, suggests that the inhabitants of every town and city throughout the Province, should pass resolutions and adopt petitions to his Excellency the Governor General requesting him in their name to invite the Queen to visit Canada.

The caloric ship Ericsson is afloat once more.—She was towed by steam tugs for 1000 yards to Jersey flats, where she would float at high water. The damage in all will exceed \$30,000. The machinery has not suffered, but the beautiful furniture is totally ruined.—*Republican Journal.*
