RUSSIAN FRIGATES IN THE PACIFIC .- The London Times says that on the 15th of March the Russian frigate Diana, of 52 guns, was in Valpadaily expected. He has, in the face of the troops he commanded, been deprived not only of the insignia of his rank, but also of the outward marks which distin guish the Ottoman soldier. After having been degraded and expelled the army, he has been taken to Shumla .- His execution was delayed by Omar Pacha sending a courier to the Porte to obtain the Sultan's assent to the execution of so great a criminal.

His Highness, I understand, saw no reason to interfere with Omar Pacha's jurisdiction, and a Lieutenant Colonel left a few days ago for Shumla bearing the despatch which seals the doom of Osman Pacha. 


