KING'S COLLEGE,
Civil Engineering, &c.

A COURSE of Instruction in Civil Engi-
neering will be given at King's College by Mr.
McMAHON CREAG, who has been appointed to that
duty by His Excellency the Governor, and will commence
on the 15th of February next and continue until the end
of April. It will be open to students of the College
on payment of a fee of Ten Shillings, and to all others
on payment of a fee of Two pounds, for the course.
Persons desirous of joining the class are requested to
communicate with the Registrar. The course will em-
brace, with other subjects, the following syllabus—
An explanation of the construction and uses of
Logarithms, Sines, Tangents, &c.; Trigonometrical
Formulae; Resolution of Plane Triangles, methods of
surveying with the Theodolite, Circumferentor, &c.;
construction, use and adjustment of the instruments
used by Engineers, both for field and office work;
levelling; method of determining best route for Rail-
way, &c.; continuation of the quantities of land, earth-
work, &c., required for the execution of the works;
estimation of comparative labor by units of work; Horse
power of Machinery, &c.; method of "setting out"
Railway curves and side widths; calculation of grad-
ients and theory of inclined planes; super-elevation of
of rail; composition and resolution of forces; calcu-
lation of strains and pressures; strength of materials;
theory and practice of timber and iron farming; viaducts
bridges, &c.
Three lectures a week will be given in the College;
and instruction in the field will also be given once a
week, or as often as may be expedient.

THE ST. JOHN AND LIVERPOOL LINE OF PACK-
ET SHIPS have now been in successful operation
since February, 1853; during which time they
have landed at this Port, thirteen cargoes of Goods
and a large number of Passengers, without acci-
dent, and free from disease. They have also es-
tablished a character for punctuality, which the
Owners trust, has been satisfactory to their
Patrons.

While tendering thanks for past favors, the
Owners beg leave to announce that the Packets
will sail from Liverpool twice each month during
the current year, and would respectfully solicit
from Importers a continuance of their confidence.
In conformity with the onward spirit of the
age, two first class Screw Steam Ships have been
contracted for and are now in course of construc-
tion by the celebrated builder, John Laird, Esq.,
of Birkenhead, to be of about 1600 tons each, in
speed and every other respect equal to any Screw
Steamers now traversing the Atlantic; one to be
launched in April, the other in May next. These
Boats are being built specially to ply between
Liverpool and this port, under the impression that
New Brunswick will extend to this enterprise
such encouragement as is granted to like under-
takings by other countries. It is intended to
make application at the next meeting of the
Legislature for a grant of £10,000 per annum, for
ten years, for carrying the Mails, and it is con-
sidered that the establishment of the proposed
Line would be of advantage to the Province, and
the desired aid be secured by a grant of the sum
specified yearly for ten years, the Boats will be
placed upon the route, but if not they must seek
employment in some other trade, where they
would be more likely to pay
