

STATE OF FEELING IN RUSSIA.

The Governor of Moscow has caused a Te Deum to be sung in honour of the victory gained by the Russians.

Accounts from St. Petersburg to the 7th instant, published in a Berlin newspaper, state that the Emperor Nicholas was far from enjoying good health; the Grand Duke Alexander, the heir to the throne, was living very much retired; while his brother was indefatigable in inspecting sailors magazines, and visiting harbours and hospitals.—A system of beacons had been arranged along the coast for giving notice of the approach of the English fleet.

The news of the bombardment of Odessa had produced a strong feeling of depression in commercial circles.

COLLISION AND LOSS OF LIFE.—On the 28th ult. the same night as the German emigrant-ship, from Bremen, foundered, with 200 persons on board, another sad catastrophe happened off the North Foreland, by which two vessels were foundered; and the crew of one lost their lives. One was the barque Kaffir, 400 tons, Captain Purse, bound to Carthagen, from Sunderland; the name of the other vessel was unknown. About ten o'clock, when distant about eight miles from the North Foreland, with a dark night and a heavy sea, the Kaffir, came in collision with another ship, and immediately was heard a cry of "Oh! our ship is going down," and before the Kaffir's boats could be got out the vessel and her crew had disappeared.

Endeavours were made to save them by Captain Purse; and when he got back to his own vessel he found she was cut to the water's edge, and was sinking fast, and he and his crew had only time to take to the boats when the Kaffir went down also. They were picked up by the Princess Royal, from Hamburg, and landed in the vicinity of the Downs.

SHARP LIGHTNING.—There was a thunder storm in this City on Monday evening—the lightning was vivid and the peals terrific. It commenced about 8 o'clock, and continued for an hour and a half. A house at the foot of St. Patrick's street near the Brussels-road, was struck. The lightning passed down the chimney, which was completely shattered, and out of the lower story windows. There were two families in the house, but no person was injured. Yesterday was a warm day. At 3 o'clock, the thermometer indicated 84 in the shade.—News.

The Washington Correspondent of the N. Y. Courier writes as follows under date of June 5th:—Lord Elgin and Mr. Hincks depart to-morrow. The Fishing and reciprocity treaty is fully arranged, subject to the decision of the provincial Congress to assemble at Montreal. We admit, duty free, Coal, Lumber and Grindstones, over which most discussion has taken place.

Official despatches from Mr. Soule, state that in addition to the remission of the fine on the *Black Warrior*, the Spanish Government accords to steamers of that line all the privileges and exemptions of British mail steamers.

England and France have demanded of Spain twenty-four thousand men for the occupation of Greece and Palestine. Spain refuses unconditionally.

England denies officially that she has tendered either ships or men to protect Cuba against the United States, or to promote the Africanization thereof.

The passenger train going east, when a few miles from London, Canada East, on Friday, ran off the track, throwing three of the cars down an embankment, by which seven lives were lost, and several seriously injured.

THE FISHERY TREATY.—The New-York Herald states that the treaty agreed upon by the Secretary of State and the British Minister, not only includes the adjustment of the fishery question, but also provides for reciprocity of trade with the North American colonies. The principle is extended to all the natural products of each country, with the exception of coal, tobacco and sugar, and it is thought the first named article will likewise be included. Great Britain has acquiesced in the terms but with the important proviso that the Colonies also agree to them.

AMERICAN SHIPS AT CRONSTADT.—Ship Flying Childers and barque Sherwood were at Cronstadt, May 12th, having obtained permission to discharge their cargoes and load, which they were doing with the utmost despatch. Vessels were still allowed to pass in and out of the harbors of Cronstadt and Revel.—N. Y. Paper.

A LARGE PRIZE OFFERED.—The United States Department of State has published a letter from that indefatigable Frenchman, Mr. Vattemare, addressed to John Y. Mason, which the latter gentleman transmitted to Secretary Marcy, accompanied with a letter from himself. Mr. Vattemare, by his will, leaves \$100,000 to any person who discovers the "means of curing Asiatic cholera, or of the cause of the pestilence." To give publicity to the fact, the publication has been made. The power of awarding the prize has been conferred on the Institute of France, and the interest of it, until it has been awarded, is to constitute an annual prize, to be given to those who advance the knowledge of the cause of cholera and its remedy.

A house near Vicksburg, Miss, was struck by lightning on the 9th ult, and pretty much demolished. A loaded gun was fired off and broken to pieces, and a cask containing powder exploded.—A keg of powder had two hoops knocked off it, but did not explode. Six persons were sleeping in the house none of whom were injured.

Six deaths from cholera occurred in the 6th ward, New York, last week. In one street eight cases are known to exist, and 100 cases are in treatment in quarantine.
