

The propositions of Manteuffel intended to preserve a good understanding not having been favorably received he tendered his resignation and left town, but was recalled and returned. King arrived and presided at Council. All that transpired of the deliberation was that Manteuffel withdrew his resignation; that conciliatory declarations are to be addressed to the Cabinet of Vienna; and that eventually Prussia is to adopt a policy in accordance with that of Austria.

Latest.—Anglo-French note to Prussians very energetic; it called on Prussia to decide for or against Western Powers. Prince of Prussia favorable to alliance was immediately sent on special mission to Vienna, and expectation now is that Prussia will declare its policy identical with that of Austria.

BRITAIN.—The London Globe says a conference is assembled on the Continent, which is without precedent—acting as we understand it under directions of the President of the United States.—The ambassadors of that country are assembled to exchange information, to consult and report to their Government on the state of affairs on the Continent. American trade is carried to every part of the world, and the conference has in view the due protection and advancement of those interests in any new arrangements of treaties that may be made in Europe. Mr. Buchanan left London on Saturday, and he has already been met by the American Ministers from Calais and Madrid.

A National subscription is set on foot for the wounded.

General Sir Gordon Drummond is dead. He served against America in the last war.

Queen of the South arrived from Australia with £147,000 in gold. £100,000 has been subscribed in Australia, to present Smith O'Brien with a gold vase.

FRANCE.—The recent mammoth lie of the fall of Sebastopol is traced to the Paris Bourse. Emperor has ordered an investigation, and says he will punish with severity whoever is proved guilty.—The correspondent of the Journal of Smyrna is implicated.

British Ambassador has notified official condolence of English Government to France on death of Marshal St. Arnaud. Moniteur publishes a letter from St. Arnaud, showing that the old man was aware of his approaching death and was ready to meet it. Malady was disease of the heart. His remains arrived at Marseilles on the 10th and were received with all honours, and an imperial decree ordered that they shall be buried in Invalids with public funeral.

RUSSIA.—A fire at Menail destroyed property to the value of 5,000,000 of thalers.

INDIA AND CHINA.—Overland Mail Telegraph Bombay Sept. 11, Shanghai August 7, Canton August 21.—Canton continued in state of siege. Shanahi still in the hands of insurgents. Ningpo Tychow and Amoy were quiet. Tea will be exported from Foocho. No Tea had arrived at Canton and business was quite suspended. Exchange at Shanghai 6s, Canton 4s.8d. Little doing in raw silk.

LIVERPOOL BREAD STUFFS.—Stocks are report small, and farmers are rather holding back their crops. The market for Wheat and flour has been consequently very firm, at an advance of one shilling and eight-pence on flour, and four pence on wheat.

Prince Edward Island Matters.

The Legislature adjourned Saturday 7th inst., to meet again Feb 13. Four bills were passed into law, viz; an Act to amend the Jury Law; an Act

to empower the Lieut. Governor to call together the Legislature during an adjournment; an Act to restrict the payment of Land Assessment; and an act to ratify the Free Trade Treaty with the United States. The Examiner very justly remarks that the latter is one of the worst measures that ever passed the legislation of this colony. The Council and Assembly jointly addressed the Queen for the continuance of a small military force within the borders of the Island. Both branches of the Legislature have agreed to place a sum of money at the disposal of the governor for the maintenance of a Constabulary force in the absence of the Troops should the same be deemed necessary. The Session lasted ten days.—N. Scotia.

In a speech at the close of the Industrial Exhibition at Halifax, last week, the Hon William Young, Attorney General and leader of the Government of Nova-Scotia, said—

"We must recollect that we are on the eve of great changes—that a market of boundless extent and increasing every hour, is about to be thrown open to our industry—and although the benefits of the Reciprocity Treaty may not be realised quite so soon as the just demands and the natural impatience of our people might expect, and the Government would willingly secure, yet in a very short time we will probably find ourselves on a new footing and feel the animating effects of the most important commercial movement of this century."

The Dublin Express says it is stated in well informed military circles that the 18th, 51st, 54th, 66th, 72nd, 80th, 82nd, 90th and 94th regiments, will form part of the British expeditionary force for the Baltic in March next. The whole of these regiments will be in England before the close of the year; and it is anticipated there will be no difficulty in raising them to their augmented establishment long before they proceed to the Baltic, the whole of the recruiting staff being exclusively employed at the present moment in the raising of men for those regiments.
