THIS Institution will be conducted on the same principles as heretofore. Everything possible is done to ensure both the comfort and improvement of the Students. Encouraged by the success of the past, the Trustees at their late Board Meeting directed that various important alterations, additions and improvements should be made, in order to render the buildings and premises of both establishments still better calculated for the purposes intended. The former Lecture Room is to be transformed into a Dining Hall for the Students of the Male Branch, and all the rooms of this elder branch are to be re-painted, re-papered, and refitted throughout. A Gymnasium is to be erected in connection with the other Branch, &c. &c. An arrangement has been made with the Lady of one of the Teachers, to take particular charge of the wearing apparel of the junior Students in the Male Branch.

The next Academic Year is to begin Thursday the 16th August, and consisting of three immediately successive Terms of fourteen weeks each, to close on the first Wednesday in June following.

\* Applications for the admission of new Pupils next Term should be made immediately.

All communications relative to the Male branch should be addressed to the Principal; those concerning the Female Branch, to the Governor and Chaplain.
