American side, where it was greeted with the loud huzzas of the multitude on shore. On returning to the Canada side and making another trip, every fear seemed to have left even the most timid, and the engine and its load, on this occasion, may be safely set down at 30 tons, and yet it occasioned no more perceptible motion in the bridge than an ordinary wagon and team .----During the second trip, Mr. Roebling, with careadjusted instruments, ascertained that the total deflection at the centre, caused by the engine and load at the point, was exactly three inches.

The Buffalo Express gives the following statistics of this bridge. Length of span from centre to centre of towers, 822 feet. Height of towers above the rock on the American side, 88 feet .--Ditto, on the Canada side, 78 feet.-Ditto floor of railway, 60 feet. Number of wire cables, 9 Diameter, of each cable 10 inches - Number of No. .9 wires in each cable, 3659.-Aggregate strength of cables, 12,400 tons; weight of superstructure 750 tons. Ditto, superstructure and maximum loads, 2250 tons .- Maximum weight of cable and stay will support 7300 tons. Height of track above the water 234 feet. Height of railroad above wagon track, 60 feet .- Morning Star.

EMPEROR NICHOLAS-EFEECT OF HIS DEATH. -The Emperor Nicholas may be regarded, perhaps, as the greatest sovereign of modern times, and a few have filled a wider space in the history of the world. With an empire extending from the Baltic to Behring's Straits, he ruled two-thirds of the circumference of the habitable globe, and over those vast territories and races he was known and felt. Throughout that immense region he might be said to be, in every sense "the State." He was identified with all its interests, moral, social, political and religious. He knew everything, inspired everything, directed everything, controlled and superintended everything, military, civil and ecclesiastical. It is not to to be wondered at that, to such a labor of thirty years' duration, even his colossal frame and strong brain should at last yield and sucumb. With the genius of the Great Frederick in administrative capacity, he had almost the genius of Napoleon for war. His moral and conscientious qualities surppassed those of either. "The sudden death of such a man, even in a time of universal peace, might well produce a stir among the crowned heads of Enrope How much. greater then must be the dread, the uncertainty, of what may be the consequences under existing circumstances. 
